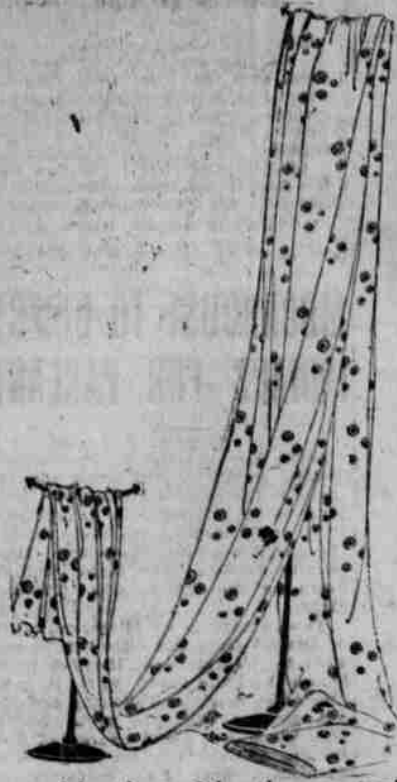

20 SEPARATORS LOST BY FIRE THIS YEAR

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 12.—Separators being destroyed by fire in the valley.

Cuban Sugar Crop for 1919-20 is Due For Rise in Price

HAVANA, Aug. 12.—That the price of Cuban sugar for the 1919-20 crop will be higher than the present figure established by the United States equalization board, seems inevitable from the present trend of events in Cuba.

A resolution presented in the house of representatives last Tuesday would authorize the president "to introduce into the buying and selling and exportation of sugar and tobacco of the crop and production which may be obtained from the time this law becomes operative and in virtue thereof of duties such measures as he may deem convenient to obtain a remunerative price for mill owners and planters in the sale of such products." The same resolution would authorize the president to impose a duty up to 15 per cent ad valorem or an increase of the existing customs charges 100 per cent on all raw materials produced in Cuba. The law would remain in effect until December 1, 1920. No action was taken on the measure Tuesday night.

Many of the planters favor forming a controlling committee of their own. They are opposed to government control. Farmers are in circulation that negotiations are under way looking to the taking over by American interests of the entire 1919-20 crop at an increased price.

One prominent planter said Tuesday he had received a bid from persons connected with English capital for delivery in January at 7 cents a pound. Such a bid on the spot was offered, he said.

HIDDEN BOMBS TELL PRESENCE BY PHONE

New Invention Warns French Farmers Where Each Explosive Lies.

PARIS, Aug. 12.—France's war zone agricultural problem of how to discover the presence underground of unexploded shells, bombs and grenades has just been solved by a little invention by Monsieur Guitton, professor of physical sciences at Nancy. Professor Guitton's invention renders the task "the simplest in the world."

With the little instrument he has perfected, each individual shell bomb and grenade now lying snugly tucked away under French soil waiting for an opportunity to blow up any farmer whose plow or harrow has the misfortune to molest it, will instead call up the farmer by telephone and notify him of the precise spot where said shell, bomb or grenade is reposing.

Professor Guitton in perfecting his invention has availed himself of Hertz's well known principle of balance by induction invented for study of the molecular structure of metals and perfected later for the use of surgeons in locating pieces of metal embedded in the flesh. Guitton's instrument consists of two large wooden hoops, each enclosing an electrical coil, one of which carries a variable electric current whilst the other one is mounted on a telephone apparatus. If the opposing currents in passing through the earth that is being examined meet with no metallic objects, nothing happens. But if they encounter a bomb, a shell or a grenade, the telephone begins immediately to buzz and all the farmer has to do is to dig the shell out with care.

The instrument will locate masses of metal weighing 25 pounds at a depth of about two feet, while smaller pieces can be located at a depth of from one foot to eighteen inches.

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SMOKE BARRAGE WILL SAVE BRAZIL COFFEE

"Alerte" and "All Clear" System of Air Raid Warning Adopted by Planters.

RIO DE JANEIRO.—(By Mail.)—

The "alerte" and "all clear" system of warning of air raids, which was used in Paris during the war, has been adopted by the coffee planters of Southern Brazil in unique measures which have been ordered to combat frost. A smoke barrage is to be adopted instead of the shrapnel which was so effectively used to "scare" enemy air raiders, and the agricultural officials of this country believe that compliance with the new regulations will provide against a repetition of the damage of last year's frost, which cost so many millions of dollars to planters and also to consumers.

During the winter of 1918 an extraordinary cold wave, beyond the memory of the "coldest inhabitants," swept over Southern Brazil, and it was during this spell that the first snow in more than eighty years fell in Buenos Aires. The frost found the planters absolutely defenceless, and when normal weather returned, it was found that millions of coffee trees were killed and a large percentage of the others injured so badly that the crops for the next three years will be cut down by about one-half. Instead of a production of 15,000,000 bags a year, seven or eight million is all that can be hoped for annually until 1921.

The frost had the effect of about tripling the local price of coffee. The new plan which has been evolved for getting the best of "Jack Frost," is being put into effect by the municipality of Itajubá, a city in the state of Santa Catharina, in the heart of the southern Brazil coffee country. Planters in other localities will watch the effect of this campaign with the greatest interest and many are considering its adoption. Its success will probably mean the enforcement of such a regulation in other districts where coffee crops would be subject to frost.

The regulations are compulsory, being issued by the agricultural authorities. Violation by planters under the jurisdiction of the district, lays them subject to heavy fines.

The project calls for the preparation of fuel for bonfires north, east and west of the coffee groves at distances of thirty to forty metres apart. This preparation must be made early in the cool season and continued for several months. Each planter must collect sufficient wood and brush to keep fires burning three nights in succession and in case the fuel reserve becomes in any way depleted must maintain the adequate supply. When the forecasters see a frost, a signal to the planters to light their fires immediately will be given by means of the firing of bombs.

The idea is to create as much smoke as possible, and has and green leaves are to be thrown on the fire. When the danger of frost is passed the planters will again be notified by bombs to extinguish their fires.

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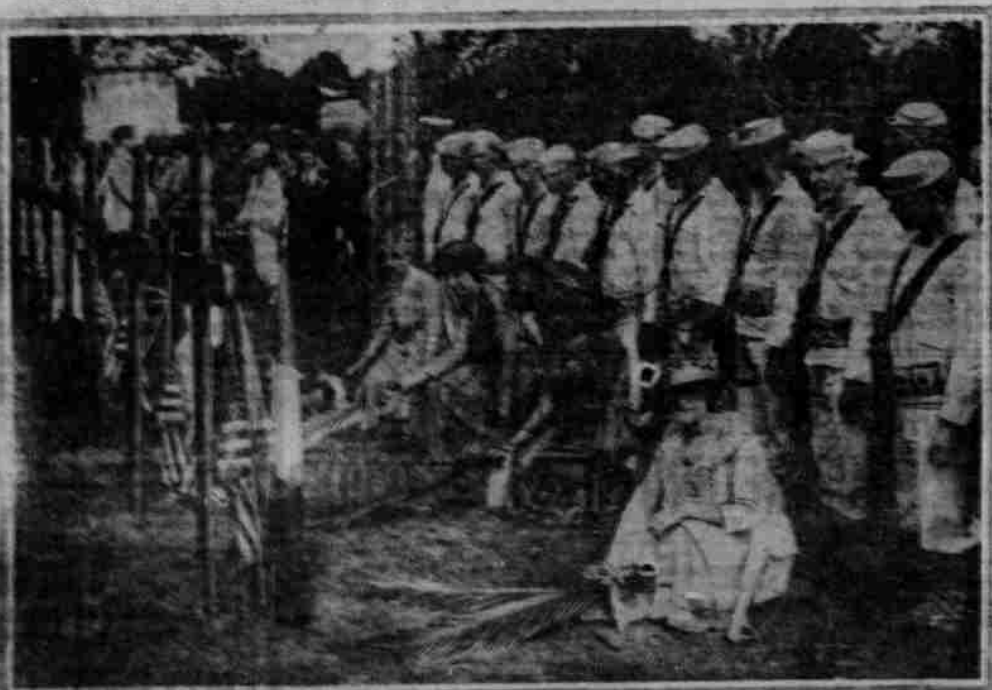
