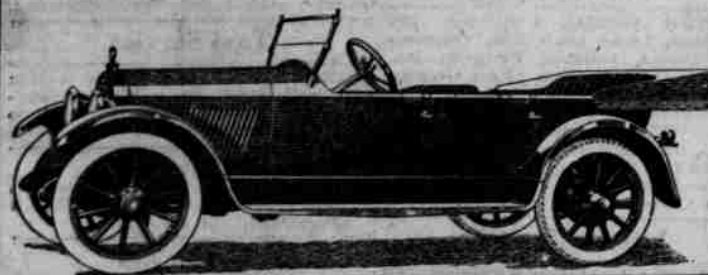

Early Crawford Are Selling Here.
Early Crawford peaches from Milton are retailing in local markets at from \$1.25 to \$1.35 a box. The producer received \$1 a box for them.

Pendleton Markets Get Local Canteloupes.
Pendleton markets are retailing canteloupes and watermelons grown in Milton. The canteloupes retail for two for 25c, while the watermelons are 1 1/2c a pound. Watermelons are considerably cheaper than when the season opened, when they retailed for 10c a pound.

Eggs Retail at 50c in Local Markets.
Eggs are retailing in local markets for 50c. The producer receives 50c. Harvest is given as the reason for the raise in prices as the eggs are in great demand at present.

Time Extended for Trade Agreements.

Certified Potato Seed Is Offered.
The farm bureau of Latah county has undertaken the production on a large scale of certified seed potatoes for the irrigated districts. The county will make an extensive exhibit of potato and other seeds at the Interstate fair in Spokane and annual seed show of Idaho at Pocatello in January.

Washington Wheat Is Yielding Well.
Whitman county's wheat production is now placed at 12,000,000 bushels, and Walla Walla county now estimates its product at 5,000,000 bushels, or half a million bushels above normal. In the vicinity of Colton a considerable acreage was in barley, and the yield is said to average 87 bushels per acre.

Turkey Red Seed Wheat to Be Had.
The superiority of Turkey red wheat for the dry, hot light soils of Oregon has been proved by the branch experiment station at Moro. Its drought, cold and smut resistance and high grading qualities make it profitable. Several thousand acres of farm crops at O. A. C. and from these fields before it is mixed with milling wheats. Lists of amounts may be had on application to the offices of the county agents of Sherman and Wasco.

Mill Stuffs Very Scarce.
While offerings of 440 a ton are being made for mill feed, there is little on the market now as mills have not yet got in full operation. Hay is holding steady at \$20 a ton but growers are showing a slight inclination to sell for less in the stack.

Markets Remain At Nominal Basis.
No hogs arrived at North Portland and the market was on a nominal basis. Cattle were considered steady and sheep showed a well-maintained price. Total arrivals in all lines were small.

EUGENE MAY RUN OWN TELEPHONES

EUGENE, Aug. 12.—Eugene is asked to consider the proposition of a municipal telephone system in a letter received from Salem by Mayor C. O. Peterson. The letter states that Salem is seriously considering the plan as a result of the increased rates of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. Albany also is thinking over the proposition.

The idea of a municipal telephone system has never been broached here, according to Mayor Peterson, and it is probable that no action will be taken until after the meeting of the public service commission on August 27 at which time the rate question probably will be determined.

"If the commission decides to let the company continue to charge the increased rates," Mayor Peterson said, "it is probable that the matter will be put up to the people for decision. If there is a demand for a local system it will be put to a vote. The matter will be discussed at council meeting Monday."

JAPANESE RAQUETIST BEATEN BY JOHNSON

I., Aug. 12.—Ichiji Kuroki, the Japanese champion, who loomed as the dark horse for the tennis honors in the invitation tournament on the Casino courts here, was beaten by a local player, William Johnston of California in straight sets today.
