**RURAL CHICKENS, RUFFLING SILKEN FEATHERS, MIDDLE CHAPTER IN NEWEST COMEDY**

Adds Another Human Role to Long List, Farm Hand in "Sunnyside." Charlie Chaplin is seen as a "hired man," the much imposed upon slave of a hypocritical farmer in "Sunnyside," his third million dollar comedy to be released by First National Exhibitors' Circuit, which will be shown at the Arcade theatre, beginning today.

The part is distinctly different from Chaplin's characterizations in "A Dog's Life," in which he played the role of a young city man, and "Shoulder Arms," in which he was a soldier, the two first \$1,000,000 comedies produced by Mr. Chaplin's new company. The entire background is that of a quiet countryside where Charlie shows his unfamiliarity with rural life in a ceaseless succession of happenings.

**Religion Gets Into The Milk**  
On a certain Sunday when Charlie is running over his herd lot it becomes his duty to go and hunt the cows while his employer goes to church. Thinking of his sweetheart, daughter of a neighboring farmer, Charlie absent-mindedly lets the cows get away from him and they stray toward the church. Charlie arrives just in time to find one of them mauling in to find out what the sermon is about.

He chases it, and, when none of the farmers seem able to suggest any means of getting it out of the church, mounts it and rides out. But his ride of triumph is short-lived for the cow throws him not only into a ditch, but into a state of unconsciousness.

The fairest of wood nymphs come to play with him. Lifting the fallen chore boy from his lowly place they glide off with him through the mazes of the dance. Of course, the originality of Chaplin rises splendidly to this occasion, and the nymphs learn things about their own art that they never knew before. Fixing his curly hair like the horns of a faun, Charlie becomes the merriest of the merry in the dance.

### AMUSEMENTS

The modern clown is a paradox. He is the same as in the days of Dan Rice, away back in the last century, and yet he is a different clown. The same in that he paints his face in vermilion and white and adheres to the time-honored, ridiculous pattern in his dress; different because his work today is practically all pantomime, whereas that of the ancient clown used to be composed of singing, reciting and telling jokes, at which time no other act worked in the big show.

The change in the clown's methods is the logical result of shifting conditions in the circus world. In other days, when one ring sufficed, the tent was necessarily small, a fact which permitted the clown to be distinctly heard from any point under the canvas.

At that time, one act was quite enough for such a limited audience.
