"That there is great demand in the senate and country for action, asking when it might be expected. I said that unless some effort was made to expedite matters in the committee an effort would be made to bring about action on the senate floor. Senator Lodge, chairman of the committee, said he was in favor of expediting matters as much as possible and did not believe there had been any artificial delay so far. I told the committee they could put on as many amendments as they saw fit in the committee and we would promptly beat them in the senate." Hitchcock said Senator Fall had a bitter debate, bordering at times on the personal. Fall, commenting on it, said he objected to Hitchcock's manner. Accuse President.

HAS CONCRETE AND WIRE "TREE" ERECTED IN YARD FOR FEATHERED GUESTS

WEST CHESTER, Pa., Aug. 12.—Dr. B. Harry Warren, for years state taxidermist and the dean of all bird lovers in this part of the state, is having erected upon his lawn an imitation tree made of concrete and wire designed as a refuge for his bird friends. The "tree" is about 15 feet in height and the concrete exterior imitates the bark of an oak. Here and there are openings, some designed for flickers or other large birds, some for martins and small cozy places for wrens. It is a most enticing place for the birds. The concrete "tree" will be placed on the lawn at the bungalow of Dr. Warren and at the base will be a large concrete basin designed as a bath for all bird callers.

Already 32 martins have established homes in a box erected for their use, and many other species are nesting about the grounds.
