GOVERNMENT FOOD SALES

It is hardly to be hoped that the sale of food supplies released by the War Department will have a permanent effect upon the cost of living. The quantity of foodstuffs of all kinds to be distributed in this way among consumers is too small to serve as a lasting factor. After the government stores have passed into the hands of private purchasers, competition with dealers will cease and they will no longer in self-defense be compelled to reduce their prices.

The government sales serve the purpose, however, of demonstrating that consumers have been systematically victimized. They help in revealing how extensively profiteering has been practised and how far the public has been gouged. They will afford temporary relief so far as actual purchasers of government supplies are concerned and may benefit others to whom dealers make concessions in prices in order to hold their trade.

Lower prices may follow as the result of other measures to be taken. It remains to be seen how effective these measures will be after the government stores are exhausted. But at least the public will have had its eyes opened to the wide-spread abuses to which it has been mercilessly subjected. The lesson will not be lost if it learns to take a hand in fighting its own battles.—New York World.

REWARDING LOYALTY

If all posts of the American Legion do as much to route disloyalty as the Clatsop Post, at Astoria, the organization would quickly find a lasting place among American institutions. Not all posts are so situated that they are confronted with the same problem and have the same opportunity as the Clatsop Post.

The disloyal remarks of the Finnish socialist newspaper, *Toveri*, have been attacked by the legion with the result that support of all loyal American business concerns is being withdrawn. The newspaper is alleged to have printed, in Finnish, remarks slandering the legion and attacking its position regarding slackers.

Its second work was to demand discharge of a Finnish alien who cancelled his first papers in order to escape service. This man holds a responsible position and the legion demands his immediate displacement by a loyal American from among returned service men. This country has no room for, nor patience with, such brand of slackers, and the American Legion deserves support of all the people in its effort to reward loyalty. It may be said to the credit of the Finnish people in that region, however, that about 99 per cent are loyal Americans at heart. An occasional case only is found where men give up their chance of becoming citizens rather than fight for America.

THE DAYLIGHT ACT

THE repeal of the daylight saving law over the veto of President Wilson was a victory of the rural population of the country over the urban population. The daylight saving law never was popular in rural districts and it was the vote of senators and congressmen from such constituencies that swung the vote.

Moving the clock ahead in summer was a good war measure for the industries. It effected great savings in coal and power by utilizing the sunlight of early morning hours. Farmers, however, found it a drawback, for stock will not change their feeding time and work in the fields can not start with the dew still heavy and end with the sun still high in the heavens.

Where the law was already ignored its repeal on October 26 will be welcome. As for the most cities, the passing or retention of the plan is about a 50-50 matter.

ABOUT THE STARS

Taurus, The Bull.

This is the second constellation in the Zodiac and undoubtedly one of the first to be observed. About the year B. C. 2176 it was the first constellation and denoted the coming of spring. The change was brought about by the precision of the Equinox as previously explained. The chief star in the group is known as "Aldebaran," the Leader, and is a standard first magnitude star emitting 10 times as much light as our sun. It is twenty-eight light years distance from the earth from which it is receding at the rate of thirty miles per second. Taurus holds a leading place in Mythology and was universally worshipped by the early Babylonians, Egyptians, Chaldeans, Greeks. It is called the Herald of Spring. The bull was also an important object of

worship by the ancient Druids, and their great Tauric festival was held when the sun entered this constellation. This festival has gradually brought down to us our present May Day festival. Allen says the Tors of England were the old sites of the Tauric worship of the Druids and that our Hot Cross Buns are the present representatives of the Ancient Bull cakes. The old English Maureid dance is also a remnant of this festival. According to mythology, Europa, the beautiful daughter of Agenor was an object of admiration to Jupiter who transformed himself into a snow white Bull and induced Europa to mount his back. He then took advantage of the situation by plunging into the sea and carrying her to Crete. Thus the name Europe was given to that country in her honor.

Castle's Widow Weds Three Months After Death Famous Flyer

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Irene Castle dancer and moving picture star, who was married here on May 3 to Captain Robert E. Eymann of Ithaca, N. Y., had been secretly married to Captain Truman for almost a year before the New York ceremony, according to the New York Herald Tuesday morning.

The Herald states that the ceremony was performed in Picken, S. C., May 21, 1918, by the Rev. Frank A. Johnson of Greenville, S. C. This date is but a few days more than three months from the time her famous husband, Captain Vernon Castle, was killed in an airplane crash at Fort Worth, Texas.

The then Mrs. Castle, says the Herald, explained to the minister that she was desirous of keeping the marriage a secret for business reasons. A second reason given, it adds, was that Mrs. Castle hoped to go overseas as an entertainer for the American expeditionary forces and realized that she would be prevented by war department regulations were it known that she was the wife of an army officer.

REAL GHOST PHOTOGRAPHS.

St. Thomas, the "first Agnostic," whose festival was placed on the shortest day to punish his unbeliever, shares this anniversary with a very militant namesake, Thomas Becket, the pilgrimages to whose shrine inspired Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales."

His spectre, known among the verges as "Thomas A. Becket's ghost," can be seen occasionally in the crypt of Canterbury Cathedral. It is a real ghost and has been photographed.

One photograph showed a dim figure of a prelate against a pillar, while another snapshot taken from the same position, but on a different day, revealed no such appearance.

Rationalists explain that an ancient fresco on the pillar, painted out at the Reformation, becomes visible through the overlaid material during damp weather.
