ANIMALS GALORE, FEATURE IN BIG CIRCUS.

the big tent while the show is going on. A very pleasing feature of the parade was the appearance of the horses. Every one of them was sleek, well groomed, and stepped along as if he knew his looks meant a great deal to him and to everybody else.

There are 20 cloths with the show. It seemed as if more than that number were in line this morning, perhaps because of the fact that they appeared to be everywhere at once.

A big team piano, in addition to the regular circus callopie is another feature which makes the Hagenbeck-Wallace parade "different". As to the circus performance itself: Everything advertised for it in the

advance notices is given, and there is so much to cause comment that description is rendered rather difficult. From the moment the grand march begins until the very last, when the band plays, The Star Spangled Banner there is not a moment which is not filled either with a thrill or a laugh. The lion act is one of the most exciting scenes imaginable. One man in a cage of the roaring, fighting beasts is enough to make the average beholder gasp, but when they attempt to take him by surprise and overpower him the tension is multiplied. Another act, that in which the largest of the Hagenbeck elephants lay down on his keeper's well calculated to cause "cold chills." The man, however, comes out of it unharmed, while the big elephant joins a number of his comrades and all do a dance, keeping excellent time to the music.

But not all with this show is a thrill. There are some of the prettiest acts ever seen in this section of the country to be seen here. For instance: There is the young woman and her horse, dog and pigeons, the other young woman who drives a stallion which insists on walking on his hind legs all the time and there is the young woman who, mounted on a big horse, gracefully sails over nine-foot hurdles as easily as a swallow skims over a barn roof. That scene alone is worth a great deal, and it is one that out here in the West, meets with great appreciation. A lover of beauty, grace and horsemanship cannot help cheering at the sight.

Human birds, bees, butterflies and angels fly about the top of the tent. These are young women dressed to represent creatures of the air. And, all the time, there are aerial artists, every one of them, of the sort which being of the sort which are positively amazing. Three little girls and a young man perform wonders on a tight rope. The girls slide down from the topmost pinnacle of the tent, one hanging by her hair, another by her teeth and a third on one shoulder. The young man makes the dizzy plunge while lanced on his head.

Tigers and elephants are natural enemies, but a Big Bengal beast rides on the back of an elephant, and from time to time jumps through a blazing hoop, returning each time to his seat on the pachyderm. In like manner a huge lion rides a horse until the latter unseats him, after which the horse chases the lion, trying to strike him with his hoofs.

It would take too long to tell all about the show. It must be seen to be appreciated.

Tonight's performance will begin promptly at 8 o'clock, and the doors will be opened an hour earlier, in order that all purchasers of tickets to the main show may stop on the way in and see the menagerie. One ticket admits to all. In order to provide greater convenience for the public, the circus management has arranged for a down town ticket office, at the Tallman Drug store, where tickets may be purchased at the same price as is being charged at the circus grounds.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Health Commissioner Copeland said yesterday that bakers here have been using a petroleum product as a substitute for lard and butter in the pie and pastry they have been selling to the public. He also said that this particular product was sold to the bakers

Represents UCRANIA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Julian Bat-chinski, prominent Ukrainian political writer, has arrived in Washington to negotiate for recognition by the United States of the Ukrainian republic, and to prepare for development of commercial relations between this country and Ukraine. He was sent to this country by Gen. Simon Petiura, leader of the Ukrainian peasant army which is fighting the Bolsheviks.

Dr. Copeland explained that while no serious injury to health might result, the use of the petroleum product for shortening took all the nutritive value out of the pastry.

About 800 doctors, nurses and inspectors of the Health Department began their house to house canvass yesterday to ascertain the effect of high prices and alleged food hoarding in homes. The Commissioner has received reports that the high cost of living has resulted in the use of substitutes that lack nutritive qualities and that as a result the health of children in some sections is materially impaired. Dr. Copeland said:

"We find that some families are giving the children weak tea and

coffee instead of milk; that others have not served meat or even eggs at their tables in a long time, and that still others are eating bread and butter as an egg substitute. In one case we have found sickly children as a direct result of this elimination of milk."

In many instances, Dr. Copeland said, fruit has been denied children. He attributes the increase in diarrhoeal diseases among them to the fact that food prices are almost prohibitive to many families.

The Commissioner has almost unlimited powers under the emergency provision and seeks to ascertain if he can act to force down prices.

BRITISH-PERSIAN TREATY STIRS PEACE COUNCILLORS
PARIS, Aug. 25.—The Anglo-Persian treaty continues to be the topic of the day in peace conference circles, the

French discussing especially the probable effect of the agreement upon French interests in Syria. A strong party in the Chamber of Deputies is advocating the extension of French influence in Syria. Henri Franklin Bouillon has given notice that he will interpellate the government on the question.

The French press does use the word "protectorate" in connection with French influence in Syria. The papers argue that from time immemorial France had great interests in Syria and claim that until Syria is able to govern herself France should be designated to afford to her such financial help as she needs.

The Aligar says that the Anglo-Persian agreement is equivalent to a protectorate over Persia and quotes the London Morning Post: "Were we not conquered in this matter we should say this was a protectorate."

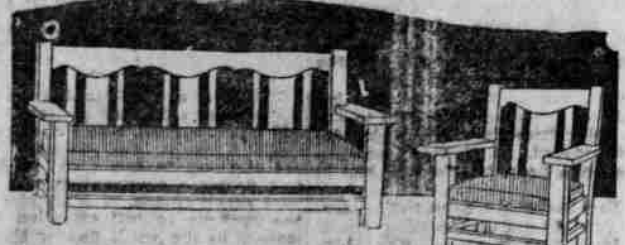
