Count Minotto will remain in America wood pulp in U. S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Instead of sailing yesterday for Copenhagen, as reported, Count James Minotto, son-in-law of Louis F. Swift, Chicago packer, who was detained for a brief period during the war on a technical charge because of his birth in Germany, intends not only to remain in the United States, but also to renounce his Italian citizenship and become an American.

"Mr. James Minotto," as he prefers to be called, will apply for his final citizenship papers within a short time and drop his title. His friends say officials who were concerned in his case now stand ready to endorse him. It was Count D. Minotto and Countess Minotto, his parents, who sailed yesterday on route for Italy. The son came here with his wife and child to see his parents off, and returned today to Chicago.

Dr. Karl Muck, leader of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, who was interned during the war as an enemy alien, sailed from here yesterday for Copenhagen on the Scandinavian American liner Frederick VIII.

Asserting that he was an American and not a German, but that he sailed for Denmark "a man without a flag or country," Dr. Muck arrived at the pier with his wife only a short time before the hour of departure.
