Tattered Flags Flying.
Some of the flags flying from Pendleton business houses have reached such a state of decay that the resemblance to the Stars and Stripes is scarcely discernible to the casual observer. The majority of the flags which catch the breeze in this city are tattered and soiled.

Harvest Almost Completed.
Harvest in Umatilla county is about 99 per cent complete and all the farmers are now busy hauling their grain to the warehouses. In 10 days they will have completed their hauling and will have nothing to do then until seedling time. Reports coming in from the various warehouses indicate that about 4,500,000 bushels were raised in the county this year. Between 10 and 15 per cent of this amount is being shipped in bulk.

Want Fountains Repaired.
Complaint is being made because some of the drinking fountains about the city are not in good working order. The fountain on Main street near the O. W. R. & N. depot is almost worthless and some of the other fountains are running such small streams that they can scarcely be used. With large crowds anticipated for the Round-Up it is asserted all these fountains should be put into first class shape for use.

Weather Report Received.

Cryder, Umatilla forest supervisor today received the following weather report: "Tonight and Friday fair; except probably thunder storms this afternoon or tonight in southwest portion; warmer Friday in eastern section. Cooler Friday in interior southwest portion; gentle winds mostly northerly. Cooler Saturday in interior northwest portion."

Board Meets Friday Night.
The school board will meet Friday evening at 7:30 in the offices of Livermore, Bickers & Friedly to act on the appointments of new teachers for the local schools. A number of contracts have been signed but the formality of the board's check must be made. There is no other business in sight at this time.

Gives Buckaroo Work.
Harry Delong, a Buckaroo, was picked up by the police last night on a charge of begging and of beating some board and room bills around town. He was to have had a hearing in police court this morning, but Clarence Adams, who is staging a wild west show at Portland, promised to give him a job with his outfit and upon promise to stand good for his bills he was released to Adams. The man was sent to Portland on the train today.

Sues on Partnership Agreement.
U. W. Bosman today started suit against V. A. Black, with whom he was formerly in partnership, for four sums of money: \$217.33, \$82.25, \$7.98 and \$8.12, alleged due as Black's share of the debts in the partnership. The first sum is the amount alleged due on a promissory note, half of which Black agreed to pay. The other sums are for taxes, etc. The plaintiff is represented by S. A. Newberry.

Awards Fuel Contracts.
The county commission today awarded contracts for coal and wood for the county library and court house for the coming year. The coal contract went to the Oregon Lumber Yard which will furnish the library with 30 tons of coal at \$11.15 a ton. The Van Patten Lumber Co. will supply 50 cords of wood to the court house for \$8.70 per cord.

GOVERNOR SAYS HE HAS NOT CHANGED MIND ON SUFFRAGETTE REQUEST

SALEM, Aug. 28.—Governor Olcott upon his return from the conference of governors at Salt Lake City, emphatically denied that he had been one of nine governors who had agreed to call a special ratification session of the legislatures of their states this fall as was reported in press dispatches from the Utah capital. The governor declared there has been absolutely no change in his attitude toward the special session to suffragette leaders prior to his departure for the Salt Lake conference. The first knowledge he had of any reported change in this policy he said today, was contained in newspaper clippings and in telegrams from half a dozen women suffragette leaders congratulating him upon his decision to call the special session.
