DISHES AND SONGS ARE NEEDS OF ARMENIANS
Songs and dishes are crying necessities at the Y. W. C. A. Service Center in Constantinople, according to Miss Margaret White, Y. W. C. A. secretary, who accompanied the Armenian Relief Mission to Europe.

In the short time that the Service Center has been established 500 members have been enrolled in addition to the numbers of Russian refugees and Armenian girls rescued from the Turks, who have called at the Service Center for help. Of this number over one-half are desirous of learning English. Enrollment of classes and the procuring of English teachers have been a big task.

Popular songs have the most appeal as texts for the English lessons. Already many of the girls who come to the Saturday evening parties, which are the general recreation evenings at the Service Center, with games and ice cream, can sing American popular songs. A victrola was recently sent over to the center.

Clubs have been organized among industrial girls in Constantinople, so that on one night of the week a club of girls from offices and stores meet at the Service Center, on the next night telephone operators, and so on during the week.

Programs are arranged for each Sunday afternoon, either a hike out into the country or a lecture by some prominent person, at the Service Center. Occasionally the Armenian girls arrange a program of old dances and folk stories.

Six Y. W. C. A. secretaries are on their way to Constantinople en route to Russia. Until the southern route is opened up they will do social and recreation work for Russian refugees in that city, entering Odessa as soon as possible.

STEEL PRODUCTION
GAINING IS REPORT

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Steel production is reported to be gaining and the eighty per cent of capacity level in some instances already has been surpassed. In the Pittsburgh district, for instance, the level is reported at eighty-five per cent. The uncertainty of the labor situation and the equally uncertain matter of production costs have combined to force sellers of steel products into a more conservative stand and buyers are now reporting greater difficulty in booking orders for future supplies.

In the pig iron market the situation is uniformly favorable and the price scale has been strengthened still more. When there is available for prompt shipment any surplus from the sellers are demanding advanced levels. The experts sales of pig iron have been estimated about 10,000 tons. Great

tonnages are reported in the way of inquiries from foreign interests and the entire exports trade in iron and steel products is considered very satisfactory.

From the point of view of sales the copper market is still quiet. Most of the activity centers around resale lots which are offered in small tonnages by speculators at material concessions from the established prices of leading sellers. One resales the level generally heard is from 21 1/2 to 22 cents per pound. This range compares with the 23 to 23 1/2 cent level quoted by leading sellers. September copper is still quoted generally at 24 cents per pound.

The lead and spelter markets are both showing more healthy signs at the moment and greater confidence is being exhibited by sellers. On lead the leading interest quotes 8 cents per pound for New York shipment with the outside market about 5 to 10 points below that figure. The general price for East St. Louis spelter is around 7 1/2 cents per pound on prompt shipment.

The local tin market continues steady at a general easy level. Straits, spot, is quoted at 70 cents. All restrictions are now lifted on this industry and the War Trade Board and the Sub-Committee on Pig Tin of the American Iron and Steel Institute
