Upon recommendation of the police committee, Police Chief Al Roberts today appointed William Bowman traffic officer to succeed H. R. Longley, resigned. Mr. Bowman will begin work Monday. He served overseas in the motor corps and has been in the harvest fields of late.

Sultry Heat Registered Today.

The thermometer hit a maximum of 97 today, with every indication pointing to rain and cooler temperature. The maximum yesterday was 95 and the night was much warmer, the low mark being 55. A few drops of rain fell early this afternoon.

Mrs. J. B. Crane of Pasco was pinned beneath an auto and drowned in the Columbia on August 28 when her husband, Dr. Crane, president of the Bank of Pasco, drove his machine off the Bosburg ferry. As the car upset in the water, Mrs. Crane was unable to save herself.

If Pendleton is unable to house all the visitors expected here for the Round-Up the committee might make a small hotel out of the school building at Rieth which has never been used, says a visitor from the terminal town who is here today. The building has one large room 24 by 40 feet and could handle several visitors.

Dr. H. M. Hanavan, recent graduate in dentistry, has purchased the office and practice of Dr. R. E. Farnsworth in room 7, Temple building and has opened the office. Dr. Hanavan practiced a short time at Pilot Rock early in the summer and has since been in Pendleton seeking a location. Dr. Farnsworth has left for Seattle.

Grain Company Sues for \$89.

The Umatilla Flour & Grain Co. today filed suit against Tow Bros. to recover \$89.10, alleged due on a trade acceptance agreement. The plaintiff alleges that the defendants agreed to pay the money at the American National Bank here on August 29 but have failed to do so. The plaintiff's counsel is Raley, Raley & Stelwer and H. J. Warner.

New Justice of the Peace.

The resignation of H. H. McReynolds, as Justice of the Peace in the Alta district near Pilot Rock, was accepted by the county commissioners yesterday afternoon. Walter Kirkpatrick was appointed to be justice in his place. Mr. McReynolds was obliged to resign because he holds the office of postmaster.

Asks for German Cannon.

Senator C. L. McNary has introduced a bill in the senate to have a captured German cannon awarded to the city of Pendleton in token of its record in the five liberty loans. Pressure was brought to bear by both the city council and the commercial association to have the award made and the senator says in his letter that prospects are good for its being awarded.

Boy Breaks Leg for Fifth Time.

Howard Roberts, 14 year old son of O. P. Roberts, of McKay creek, Thursday night broke his leg for the fifth time. The boy was saddling a horse when the stirrup hit the leg a hard blow and snapped it. The boy had his fourth break set by Mayo Brothers at Rochester and it was thought that the bones would heal properly. It is feared he may lose the use of the leg. He is a grandson of George Roberts, of Rieth and a grand nephew of Police Chief Al Roberts.

Big Yield in LaCrosse County.

C. F. Schoonmaker is here for a day's business trip before returning to LaCrosse, Washington, and reports that the wheat yield in that section is excellent. A ranch near LaCrosse owned by Ira Scott of Athena, yielded 19,000 sacks of No. 1 wheat. The average yield, says Mr. Schoonmaker, is 20 bushels to the acre, for fall wheat which tests No. 1. 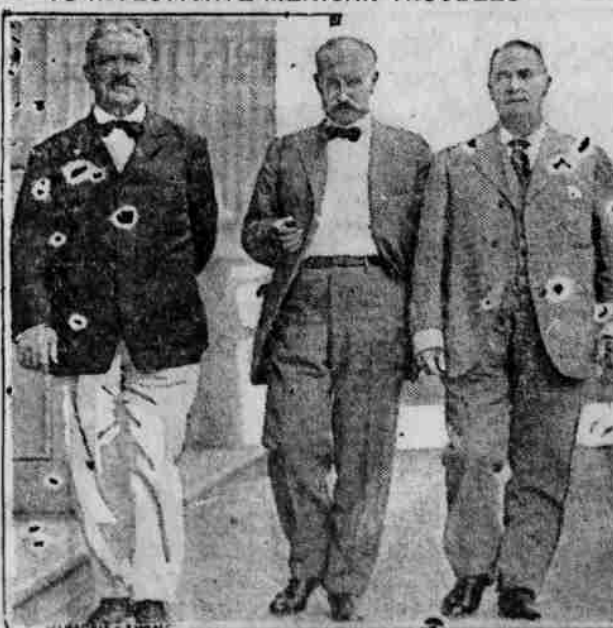
