William F. Duncan, who was brought to Pendleton by William Oliver, Echo marshal, last night, was committed to the Eastern Oregon State Hospital today. He has been in the state hospital three days, having come from the east.

High Schools Maintain Standards.
The Hermiston and Milton high schools and the high school department of St. Joseph's academy have filed notices with the county school superintendent that they have received the equipment required of a standard high school under the state law. Public schools which so qualify are entitled to money out of the county school fund.

Returns Man to Hood River.
John Nester, wanted by authorities at Hood River for the alleged theft of a suit, suitcase and handbag, was arrested on No. 18 when he arrived here Friday evening by Sheriff T. D. Taylor. A deputy sheriff from Hood River came up on No. 6 and returned with the man on No. 19 this morning. He is said to have been wearing the suit but the grips were carried past on the train and have been wired for.

Women's Building Has \$3000 Here.
The fund for the Women's building at the University of Oregon has been swelled about \$3000 by pledges from Umatilla county alumni. Dr. John Straub, of the faculty, told the East Oregonian today. Dr. Straub has been in this vicinity for the past week and declares that he is meeting with encouraging success. He will next go to The Dalles, to carry on the campaign among alumni and friends.

Heavy Judgments Awarded.
Ed Campbell was today awarded judgment for \$2500 from E. J. and Rena Bremer, together with \$300 attorney's fees, and a mortgage on the property ordered foreclosed to satisfy the judgment. Mr. Campbell's mortgage was decreed a prior lien to that of the Peoples Warehouse, which corporation is given judgments for \$917.36 and \$264.07 against the same defendants. The property mortgaged is ordered sold under execution.

Dairy Expert Here.
F. W. Kheril, of the western office of the Dairy Division, is in Pendleton today to confer with Fred Bennison, county agent, regarding a dairy demonstration to be given at the Hermiston Hog and Dairy show in October. Mr. Kheril just arrived from the Walla Walla fair and says that the livestock exhibit was the best in the history of the fair. The demonstrations at the Hermiston show will be for the purpose of showing the advantage of good herds.

Sued on Five Accounts.
Omer Stephens, of Athens, is plaintiff in an action started in circuit court today against W. E. Schriener to collect five accounts, totaling close to \$400. One account for \$140.27 is for groceries and goods sold by the plaintiff, while other accounts, of \$59.85, \$23.82, \$29.80 and \$105.55 were assigned by other firms doing business in Athens. Homer I. Watts is attorney for the plaintiff.

Wants Partnership Dissolved.
Peter Gubis, partner with George Gennokopoulos, today started suit to have an accounting, have a receiver appointed to handle the business and declare the partnership dissolved. Gubis, who has just returned from the army, alleges irregularities in the conduct of the business and asks that the property belonging to the partnership be sold and the business affairs closed up. He is represented by James A. Fee.

Complete Industrial Club Projects.
Miss Veda Wattenburger, of Echo, has filed a report of the completion of her poultry club project with County Superintendent W. W. Green. It shows that she was successful in the raising of chickens and that she stands an excellent chance of again winning the trip to the state fair at Salem. Miss Wattenburger, who is but 15 years of age, is correspondent for the East Oregonian at Echo in addition to her other duties. Claud Haddock, of Hermiston, has completed his garden club project with equally good success.

Man Appeals to Salvation Army.
James P. Chambers, returned Canadian soldier who was in Pendleton yesterday on his way to Portland, was robbed last night by an unknown assailant who hit Chambers on the nose before taking all the money he had. Chambers was crossing the railroad tracks near the Golden West creamery when the encounter occurred. The soldier appealed to the local branch of the salvation army and was taken to Thompson's drug store where his wounds were dressed. The Salvation Army gave further assistance in the purchase of Chambers railway ticket to Portland.

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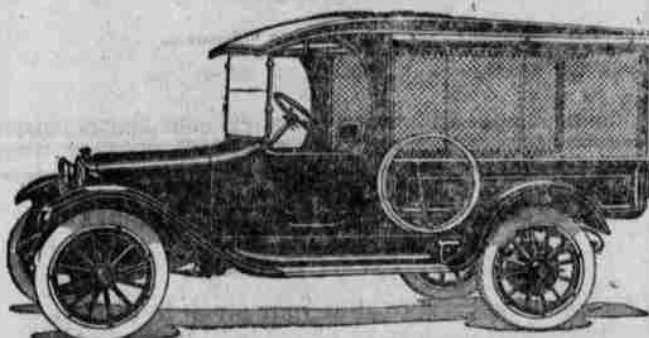
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
