SOLVING THE PROBLEM.
PENDLETON, city that
does things, has yet to
witness a solution of the
house shortage question. For
more than six months man has
met man, shaken his head and
remarked that "we ought to
have more houses." But shak-
ing of heads and truly spoken
words have not relieved the
shortage.
Yakima, not so different a
city from Pendleton, faced a
deficit of 600 dwellings. Pop-
ulation increased while build-
ing did not. After the citizens
had seen enough of prospec-
tive investors leaving because
they could find no suitable
home, they got busy.
Yakima organized an asso-
ciation, capitalized at \$250,000
that will go into the house-
building business. It will have
homes for sale and homes for
rent. It will have homes that
are habitable. Pendleton has
a few vacant buildings still
but very few that persons
would care to make their home.
