### ECHO PIONEER WOMAN CROSSED PLAINS IN 62

(East Oregonian Special.)

ECHO, Oct. 1.—Funeral services for the late Mrs. Mary A. Wattenburger who died at the home of her son, J. C. Wattenburger of Portland, September 26, after an illness of 24 days were held in Heppner, Tuesday at 1 o'clock.

Mary Ann Hatcher was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, May 25, 1837, being at the time of her death, 82 years, 4 months and 1 day. She was married in March, 1857 to Jacob H. Wattenburger. To this union, ten children were born, three of whom died in infancy, while Mary Ellen, wife of J. T. Ayres, died in Heppner, Oregon, October 10, 1912. The following children survive her: Eliza Pinkerton of Athens, W. J. Wattenburger of Echo, S. W. of Lake County, Cal.; J. C. of Portland; A. E. and Mrs. E. O. Neill, both of Butter Creek. Besides these, she leaves a sister in

Missouri, thirty living grand-children and fourteen great-grandchildren.

The deceased was a pioneer of Oregon, having crossed the plains in 1862 by ox team. She was a member of the United Brethren church for many years.
