The money appropriated is sufficient to build 125 miles of paved road and 600 miles of graveled laterals. The vote was 2141 for the bonds and 528 against.

It was 365 days ago yesterday that the 181st Brigade was relieved for the second time in the Argonne. The last few days have been a succession of anniversaries for the 91st, who during October experienced some of the most strenuous fighting of the recent world war.

Hard Luck Hits Football Squad.

Every night this week will see the 20 or more men, who compose the squad, hard at work getting in shape for the coming battle. \$888,390.58 Expended in Umatilla.

Of the \$5,360,331.26 in state and federal funds expended and contracted for road work east of the Cascades since 1914, Umatilla county's share was \$888,390.58, the largest sum expended in any one Eastern Oregon county. The funds since 1914 expended and contracted for west of the Cascades totaled \$15,711,325.71, making a grand total for Oregon of \$21,071,666.97. Douglas county's share is \$2,337,938.18, the greatest share of any one county in Oregon.

Kennwick Boys Sent to Home.

Frank and Orval Pace, lads from Kennwick, were sent home this morning by Juvenile Officer John Halley Jr., after having been found penniless in the city Saturday night. The boys, aged 11 and 8, had been on a visit to Camas Prairie and exhausted their funds upon reaching here en route home. here on a trip to Elgin, then returned and went home. A few days later they reappeared saying they were going to Camas Prairie. It was on their way home again that they ran out of funds.

Will Organize Farm Bureaus.

Fred Bennion, county agent, and Miss Ella May Harmon, county demonstration agent, left today for Hermiston where they will organize farm bureaus throughout the west end of the county. Columbia will be the first to organize and arrangements have been made with the assistance of F. I. Phipps, Henry Sommerer, Frank Waageman, E. E. Graham and M. R. Gullaher. At Hermiston, J. F. McNaught, George Cressy and E. P. Dodd have been active in assisting the agents in arousing interest in the bureau. Umatilla wants the bureau as a means of aiding in a drive against rabbits. Stanfield and Echo both offer opportunities for a bureau as these localities need demonstrations on improved methods of feeding, and the use of sulphur on alfalfa land. The two towns are also interested in the rabbit poisoning. The bureau is interesting to both men and women.
