"TEA FOR THREE" WINS SALT LAKE AUDIENCE

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 13.—"Tea for Three," the clever and novel comedy, which pleased New York theatergoers, attracted a large audience at the Orpheum, when presented for the first time in Salt Lake by a well selected company, headed by Norman Hackett, who renewed a pleasant acquaintance in this city.

The play deals with a man, his wife and a third party. The manner in which the husband was cured of an unreasonable jealousy by a plan, which took on rather a serious aspect, at least to those not on the inside, for a time makes the theme of the play. Through a brisk fire of bright conversation, which pervades three acts, artistically staged, the end is a happy one. The author of the unusual comedy is Roi Cooper Megrue.

Mr. Hackett gracefully assumes the role of the bachelor physician, known as "the Friend," who has his angle that the triangle can be square. He gives the somewhat cynical witticisms of the role particular pith and in the semi-serious requirements is possibly at his best.

Mildred Evans is charming as "The Wife, who has her angle that it must be a right angle." Miss Evans dainty beauty and exquisite gown add much to the part, and her clever acting makes of the vivacious, sentimental, warm hearted woman, a vivid, appealing personality. Hayden Stevenson depicted the character of "The Husband, who does not know much about angles," creditably. In the minor roles of the maid and the valet Marie Newkirk and S. Sydney Cohn completed an excellent cast.
