\$10000 IS OFFERED AT PRISON FOR OPERATION

SAN QUENTIN, Nov. 8.—Physicians at the prison here today received an

offer of \$10,000 from a prominent businessman if they would transfer to him the reproductive intestinal glands of Antonio Lapara, who is to be hanged December 19. But the glands are not for sale.

A prominent California physician also asked that the operation be performed on him but even professional courtesy cannot break down prison rules. Vigor that money cannot buy will be transferred by doctors to the

poorest specimen of manhood they can find in the prison—a man without money or friends who has been rejected by society.

CITY OVER THE TOP IN ROOSEVELT CAMPAIGN

Nine hundred eighty-eight dollars and 21 cents, representing the donations of 500 people of this city, put Pendleton over the top in the Roosevelt Memorial Fund drive, according to announcement made today by David Nelson, chairman. Mr. Nelson says that the local drive was unique because the total was reached by subscriptions from many individuals, instead of by large donations from a few. He and Roy Ritner, county chairman, are well pleased because the quota of \$900 was exceeded.

Albert Minthorn, prominent Indian of the Reservation district, erected a large monument to the memory of his wife, the late Mrs. Minnie Minthorn, on Tuesday at the McKay creek cemetery. About 50 friends gathered at the cemetery, where Rev. J. M. Cornwell was in charge of the ceremonies. Phillip Jones, member of the Tutuila church, spoke also. Mrs. Minthorn was prominent in church work before her death which occurred a few months ago.

New Road Washed Out.
The new road at the head of East

Birch creek which had only recently been completed by the county, is reported washed out and impassable.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT TO BE UNDERTAKEN SOON

Nearly ten miles of grading and graveling of county roads will be undertaken shortly, according to a statement made today by R. E. Phelps, road master. Three jobs of three miles each are about to be begun.

The diagonal road, leading northwest from Herndon, will be graded by the farmers affected and gravelled by the county. This will be undertaken within the next two weeks.

A road running three miles up Stage Gulch from Stanfield will be graded and gravelled under the same arrangement, with the farmers to do the grading shortly.

A third job of three miles extends from Milton up the Little Walla Walla river. About 1000 yards of graveling will be done on the road near Henry Roenburg's place at Fulton.

In addition, three miles leading west from Heli will be improved with funds raised by the farmers. They are waiting for completion of the survey by County Surveyor A. E. Perry.

JUDGE SCORES STRIKE AS HEARING OPENS

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 8.—A request by counsel for the United Mine workers to postpone the coal strike injunction proceedings this week was made today by Judge Anderson in the federal court. Judge Ames, representing the government, refused to assent, and the hearing proceeded. The miners' attorney stated that if the hearing was postponed a week the matter would be settled out of court, according to his information.

"Questions involved in the case are so important the government cannot consent to delay," said Ames.

Mind Made Up.
The judge interrupted arguments by attorneys for the miners to state that his mind was made up on the questions involved.

"I think this is the most lawless thing I ever saw in my life," he said. "I consider this a rebellion. That's what it is. The government is supreme, even to the labor unions."

Injury Irreparable.
The judge declared the strike would result in "irreparable injury." He said "The government alone stands to lose millions of dollars through lack in the coal supply." He stated he does not think the question of when the war ends is a just issue in the case. "It is a political question," he said, "and the courts must follow the statutes."

The judge would not permit the miners' attorneys to present their arguments. When he said his mind was made up, Chief Counsel Warrum said: "I am through" and sat down. Attorney Tooker took up the miners' arguments but Anderson said his statements were useless.

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
