**BRITAIN IS NEW LAND UNDER PEACE REIGN**

LONDON, Nov. 12.—From England's first year of peace, with its unrest, its nervous haste back to peace conditions, its feat of fitting three and a half million soldiers back into industry, rises one large fact: England has become a new England.

Four and a half years of fighting, of war pressure at home, have effected a change in the people and country that is fundamental—a change that now stands revealed, that the confusion of war has lifted.

Culminating in a great industrial war to block what Labor regarded as a first move to restore the old pre-war wage level and standard of life, the first twelve months of peace have demonstrated time and again how deep this transformation is, how the nation's outlook on life has altered.

In Flanders and France, Englishmen of all ranks and classes unwillingly got themselves made over—in their ways of thinking, their personal discipline, and their capacity for doing things.

The past year has shown their determination to carry these new standards into their peace-time lives.

At home, conditions and customs had been moving, too. Towards the end of the war, some two million Americans, in England for varying periods, helped move things a little further.

Not until all was over and the prospect arose of taking up the old peace-time pursuits again, did England realize how much it had changed. A large part of the population decided then they did not want to go back to the old.

**ADVERTISING RATES MUST GO UPWARDS**

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—News-papers advertising rates must be advanced and advertising space restricted to enable publishers to meet conditions caused by the existing shortage of print paper, Frank Glass, president of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, told association members at a meeting called to consider the paper situation.

**WOULD TAKE WOMEN IN AMERICAN LEGION**

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 12.—Deportation "forever from our shores" of unfriendly aliens will be urged by Connecticut delegates to the national convention of the American Legion at Minneapolis this week.

Acceptance as honorary or active members of the legion of women who engaged in war service will be recommended, the resolution having been adopted by unanimous vote at the recent state convention here.

**BAY STATE VETERANS ARE FOR NO POLITICS**

WORCHESTER, Mass., Nov. 12.—Massachusetts delegates to the American Legion convention at Minneapolis, Minn., this week will urge a resolution forever barring politics from the organization.

Delegates also went to the convention under instructions to "make strong representations for reorganization of the War Department with a

view to giving both regular army and other military officers equal opportunities for promotion." At the recent state convention here delegates voted to bar, from discussion all questions not directly concerning the legion. This action resulted in the defeat of efforts of several delegates to put the Irish question before the convention. Discussion of the Flinn situation and the Boston police strike were similarly barred.
