

STIFF PROBLEM FACES MAKERS OF PENDLETON BUDGET FOR YEAR 1920

**Council Orders Drafting; City
Property Valuation Placed
Lower to Equalize With
County, Expenditures Mount.**

Drafting of a budget for the operating expenses of the city in 1920 was referred last night to the finance committee of the city council with instructions to have it completed and approved before the end of November. The 1919 budget called for \$65,818.81. A stiff problem faces the budget makers, inasmuch as the valuation on city property has been placed lower in this year's assessment in order to equalize values with those in the country. A resume of expenditures for the first eight months this year indicates that the city budget will have to be considerably larger for next year.

On protest of the cemetery committee the council voted to have the person or persons apprehended who have been using the cemetery grounds for slaughtering broken down horses. One of two men, according to report of Peter Bellomo, sexton, have been driving in cavasses, removing the hides and then burying them. The animal burying ground is supposed to be for animals which die in the city, the committee told. Chief of Police Roberts was instructed, by motion made and carried, to bring the offenders before the police judge.

Plans and specifications for crosswalks, which are paid for by the city, were presented by the city engineer. They were referred to the street committee and will be reported back next meeting.

ECHO WILL EXPEND \$9000 DURING YEAR

The first town in Umatilla county to report its 1920 city tax levy is Echo, which will raise an even \$9000 for expenses of government. The report was received today by County Assessor C. F. Strain from W. H. Cray, city recorder. In 1919 the city levy was \$3712.54.

A special election held Nov. 4 is responsible for the greatly increased tax budget. The amount to be raised by the regular tax levy is \$2900 but the special election voted the sum of \$2913 to replace water mains and \$2187 for the payment of outstanding warrants.

FRUITVALE VOTES 50 MILL SCHOOL TAX

The first known instance of a school district in Umatilla county taxing itself the statutory limit of 50 mills is reported from school district No. 72, near Fruitvale. This district in special election recently voted to raise \$12,000 for the erection of a new building. The persons affected said that they felt able to meet the heavy tax for the district, inasmuch as they raised a bumper crop of prunes which brought a record price.

CALIFORNIA TO URGE ANTI-ALIEN LAND LAW

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—United Press.—A national anti-alien law that would prohibit persons not eligible to American citizenship from owning or leasing land will be the main resolution which the California delegates to the national convention of the American Legion at Minneapolis will fight for.

The proposed law is based on the present California anti-alien land laws which prohibit orientals from owning land in the state, but its provisions are even more strict in interpretation.

Other recommendations that will be made to the national convention are a resolution asking withdrawal of American troops from Siberia; a resolution calling for a standing army of 50,000; approval of compulsory military training for six months of all youths in their 19th year.

ASTORIA TO DONATE LAND, IF NECESSARY, FOR NAVAL STATION

**City Ready to Take Any Step
Proper to Secure \$7,500,-
000 Federal Appropriation
for Establishment of Base.**

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—If a federal appropriation of \$7,500,000 for the establishment of naval base at Tongue Point, in Cathlamet bay, near Astoria, depends upon the gift of 25,000 acres of land by the people of Astoria, the land be donated.

This statement by E. F. Stone, president of the Port of Astoria commission, Wednesday defied the stand of Astoria in reply to Representative C. N. McCarthy's declaration that it was "regrettable" the site had not been offered.

Stone arrived in Portland Wednesday from Seattle, armed with a completed telegraphic review of the naval base question from McCarthy. He, with Astoria backing him, is ready to take whatever step may be found proper.
