



FRANCO-BRITISH COALITION TO STAVE OFF UNWARRANTED BY GERMANY EFFECT TODAY

Countries Exchange Formal Notices of Ratification Whereby Britain Agrees to Stand by Former Ally; Allied, German Commissioners Consider Execution of Terms.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—The Franco-British treaty by which Britain agrees to go to the aid of France in the event of unwarranted German aggression became effective today when Earl Crewe, on behalf of Britain and Foreign Minister Pichon on behalf of France, exchanged formal notices of ratification.

EASTERN OREGON WELL REPRESENTED IN STOCK EXPOSITION AT PORTLAND

Umatilla County Agricultural Agent Clerks for Judging, and on Return Lands Showing at International Exhibit.

Eastern Oregon made a good showing in the exhibit of carlot stock at the International Livestock Exposition, says Fred Bennion, county agricultural agent, who returned this morning from the exposition, where he clerked for the judging of the carlot stuff and for the Aberdeen Angus cattle.

Mr. Bennion cites as an example the winning of the first prize for a carload of light fat hogs by George Strohm, of Hermiston. Mr. Strohm's 50 Duroc hogs won the prize of \$250, and at the auction yesterday the hogs sold at 20 1/4 cents or \$266 1/4 for the entire lot.

The Eastern Oregon Beef Cattle company of Haines won most of the prizes for carlots of cattle. Mr. Bennion, E. W. Cules, of Haines, with a car of two year old grade Herefords, won first prize. The cattle sold for \$24 a hundred, or \$19 a hundred over the market price.

Mr. Bennion says the Exposition was a credit to the Northwest and exceeded all expectations. The building, which covers seven and a half acres, was filled with exhibits, besides the temporary sheds which were built practically all the stock, he says, was from the northwest, although there was some from Colorado.

UNFAVORABLY RECEIVED

DES MOINES, Nov. 21.—Governor Harding's proposal that the governors of soft coal producing states seize and operate the mines in an effort to secure resumption of mining operations has been unfavorably received. The proposal was submitted to nine governors. Of seven replies received by Harding only one approved the plan.
