Cattlemen are rejoicing because the weather is milder than it was during October, states Mr. Laszinka.

Children's Clinic Tomorrow.
Children between the ages of three months and six years will be tested at the clinic tomorrow from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. at the City Hall. Children whose names begin with letters between "A" and "M" will be tested between the hours of 1 p. m. and 2 p. m., while those whose names begin with letters between "M" and "Z" will be tested between the hours of 2 p. m. and 3 p. m. Those in charge of the clinic ask that each mother bring a blanket in which to wrap her child while the examination is being given.

Miss Rugg Nominated.
Miss Grace Rugg, Pendleton girl who is attending University of Oregon, has been nominated to attend the Student Volunteer Convention at Des Moines, Iowa, as a representative of the senior class. The University will send 12 delegates, and to raise money to send them, votes will be sold at \$1 each with which the purchaser may vote for the man or woman he delegates. Six men and six women will go representing the senior class, three each the junior and sophomore classes and two the freshmen. Thirty students have been nominated.

Offices are Completed.
Complete new furnishings have been installed in the offices of Dr. H. H. Hattery, physician and surgeon, who has moved into new quarters in the American National Bank building. The offices consist of a reception room and hall, an X-Ray room, a private office and a work room. The reception room and hall have been furnished in a color scheme of blue and tan, with hangings to match, while the private office is in tan and rose. The work room and X-Ray room contain Dr. Hattery's modern equipment and special care has been taken to insure good lighting for these rooms.

Will Poison Bre's Rabbit.
Seventy farmers of Stanfield, Hermiston, Butter Creek, Umattilla, Echo, Columbia and Holdman have signed up to buy poison for use in the rabbit extermination campaign. The county court will buy the poison at wholesale price and will sell it at this price to the farmers. The poison will be mixed with alfalfa at general mixing stations and then distributed to the farmers. It is planned to use the poisoned hay, which absorbs the poison, D. L. Jamison, of the U. S. Biological Survey, and Fred Bennett, county agriculture agent, are active in promoting the campaign.
