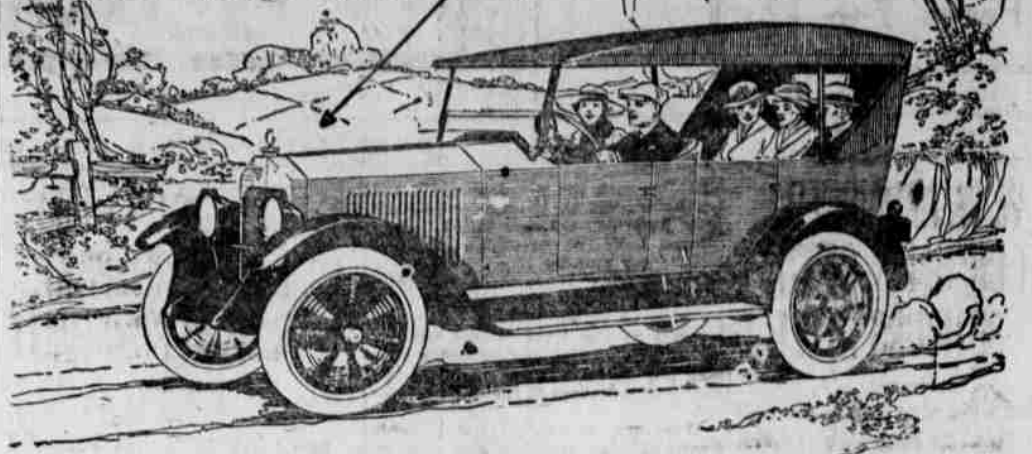

JAPANESE WOULD HOLD LIQUOR FROM ALL UNDER 25; RICE SUPPLY SHORT

TOKIO, Nov. 21.—Secretary Tago of the Home Office is engaged in drafting a drastic prohibition bill which will be laid before the forthcoming session of the diet. The bill would prohibit the drinking of liquor by men and women under 25 years of age. This is the first time the government has looked with favor on a temperance measure, although similar bills have been introduced from year to year by Nemoto, a member of the diet, and an ardent Christian. The need of conserving rice has caused the move to favor the limiting of the drinking of sake. The bill will probably make an exception in the case of the time-honored custom of drinking sake at wedding ceremonies.
