DIVISION OF \$17,000 TO BE MADE ON THURSDAY

Detectives Phillips and Tackaberry of Portland Who Played Leading Role in Capture Awarded \$3000 Each.

Sheriff Til Taylor will receive \$2500 as his reward for aiding in the capture of David Smith, James Ogle and Walter Daanster in Portland one week ago Saturday. Eight others, including John Doe, informant, will share the \$18,000 reward posted for the arrest and conviction of the murderers of J. N. Burgess and George E. Peringer, Pendleton citizens, at Claremont Tavern on November 21.

R. L. Phillips and J. M. Tackaberry Portland detectives who played the leading role in the capture of the murderers, were awarded \$3000 each by the committee which met yesterday afternoon with Mayor George L. Baker, of Portland. The unidentified informant was given \$5000. Others who were given portions of the money are:

- R. P. LaSalle, detective, \$500.
- Pat Maloney, detective, \$500.

Will Be Paid Thursday

Division of the \$17,000 now in the hands of Mayor Baker will be made Thursday. The remaining \$1000, posted by Governor Ben Olcott, cannot be paid until the legislature meets in 1921 and votes the appropriation. The nine beneficiaries will receive \$3000 each. The sheriff's portion being \$2361.10.

John Doe, the alleged ex-convict who gave the detectives their information, presented an agreement calling for \$7000 for his services, at yesterday's meeting. Judge James A. Foe and Mayor John L. Vaughan, representing Pendleton's interest, objected to this agreement and the man compromised at \$5000. The distribution of the reward money as made was reported satisfactory by Judge Foe this morning, following his return from the conference.

Taylor's Work Cited
Mayor Vaughan called attention of the conference to the fact that Umatilla county citizens had raised the majority of the reward money and for playing the part Sheriff Taylor played in the capture, he was entitled to a good share. The sheriff, together with Detectives Leonard and Phillips, entered the Murphy house and took the three men prisoner, while Detective Tackaberry, it is said, followed shortly with an equitable and satisfactory division of the money occupied the major portion of the afternoon, it being necessary for each man who took part in the capture to relate to the committee the exact work done in the case. Through the calling of the meeting yesterday by Mayor Baker, it is believed that a record has been established in the swift payment of reward money. In many previous cases it has been several years before rewards offered shortly after a crime had been committed were paid.

EL PASO, Dec. 2.—The sensational slaughter of 874 Carranzista soldiers of the Rancho Espeso garrison by Villa's band, which is reported by the border today, despite official denials, arrived here from Mexico today.

8000 PLANTS IN CHICAGO BURNING LAST OF SUPPLY
