COUNCIL ACCEPTS NEW STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Final estimates on the Grant street sewer system were presented to the city council last night by City Engineer F. B. Bays, the report accepted and the warrant ordered drawn in favor of E. C. Day, contractor, for \$1629.26. Mr. Day's bond and contract were presented and approved. The sewer has been completed and accepted.

The council also accepted the new motor driven street flusher which was delivered and tried out last week. The street committee recommended its acceptance after thoroughly trying it out. No warrant for the payment of the contract price, \$5215 was ordered drawn, however.

Petitions for paving Madison street between Madison and Main and that portion of Main street from Martin

south to a connection with the present end of pavement were reported on by the street committee. The committee recommended that the Martin street improvement be made but reported adversely on the paving of Main street further than at present. The petition was presented sometime ago by Dr. David B. Hill and others. Owing to the small amount of work required of the street commissioner during the winter, the council voted to give H. B. Longley, street commissioner, the job of driving the power flusher. In return for his holding down two jobs instead of one, his salary was raised \$15 a month to \$125.

Fee is Refunded
Alex Burt, a plumber who paid to the city \$25 as license fee for a plumber's license, was ordered refunded his money inasmuch as the council recently repealed the fee provision.

Petitions from residents of several localities for street lights were referred to the light committee with instructions to report at the next meeting. One petition, from West Railroad street, has been pending for several weeks.

Much of the session was taken up with the auditing and approving of November's bills. Six councilmen and the mayor were present.

COAL PRIORITY LISTS PLACE ARMY AT HEAD

Army and navy officers and other branches of the federal government in Pendleton come first in a list of those who shall receive coal deliveries, according to an order received from the railroad administration today by T. P. O'Brien, of the local O.-W. R. & N. offices.

Next in the list are the state, county and municipal institutions and private hospitals, followed by the public utilities, plants furnishing light, heat, water, power, transportation, etc. Fourth in the list are public buildings, offices, stores, bakeries, laundries, residences, apartment houses, with cold storage plants fifth in line. Creameries, milk bottling and canning factories are sixth in the list.

Plants not included in the order are to be given coal only to the extent necessary to protect against fire and freezing. The instructions are to apply on coal now on hand and hereafter realized. Dealers will not deliver coal to any consumer in any of the mentioned classes having a week's supply on hand.

THREE KILLED IN RIOT OF ROMAN SOCIALISTS

ROME, Dec. 4.—Three persons were killed, at least a dozen injured, many severely, in rioting, resulting from socialist demonstrations at the opening of the chamber of deputies Monday. Two were killed at Milan when carabinieri fired into a crowd of workmen. The demonstrators fired on the Rome carabinieri, who returned the fire, killing one and wounding six. Rome is placarded today with manifestos praising Bolshevism, urging workers to establish soviets.

Socialists have called a temporary general strike in Rome, Milan and Florence. Printers have quit, leaving the city with only two newspapers.

Socialist leaders declared the general strike will be extended to a London-wide walkout unless protection is afforded the socialists. The strikers in Rome, Florence and Milan will be continued today, it is understood.
