Coldest Night in December.

Last night was the coldest night of December, when the thermometer dropped to six degrees above zero. The same temperature was experienced here on the night of November 27, the coldest of the winter season. Today's maximum is 25.

Four Times as Much Snow.

The depth of the snow in the Umatilla National Forest is four times that of the snow in the forest in 1915, states W. W. Cryder, Umatilla forest supervisor who bases his estimates on the reports received from forest rangers. There is five inches of snow north of Spray, while at this time last year there was no snow in the Spray region.

Drinks Came High for McMahon.

The freight is to take the place of the passenger train during the fuel shortage. It left this afternoon at 12:30. When the train will arrive and depart in the future is uncertain, though the schedule time for arriving is 9:10 a. m. and for leaving, 10:15.

Charles W. Brownfield, local capitalist, was stricken with acute appendicitis at his room at 4 o'clock this morning and rushed to St. Anthony's hospital where, at 5 o'clock, he was operated on. He is reported to be recovering from the operation, although he will be in danger for several days, owing to the fact that the appendix had been ruptured. He returned Saturday morning from Portland in ill health and complained Sunday afternoon of pains in the region of his appendix.

Cold Causes But Slight Delay.

Cold weather has slowed down construction on the warehouses which are to surround the main mill building of the new Collins flour mill, but interior work has not been hindered. Millwrights are busy installing the machinery which is on hand and the two remaining carloads are expected this week as they have been on the road since November 19. Satisfactory progress is reported and little fear is expressed that the coal shortage will serve to delay construction appreciably. Warmer weather will be necessary, however, before the warehouse construction can be completed.

Grass Badly Trampled.

One distinct trail is in evidence, and with the coming of the snow, the paths are becoming numerous. The lawn is much admired by travelers who pass through Pendleton and Mr. O'Brien is anxious that the spot of green be preserved.
