The zero weather is unusually early for Pendleton, say old timers. They recall the winter of 1874, when extreme cold was noticed as early as December. More recent records show that in 1918 the thermometer sank to zero not earlier than February. At that time the snow reached a depth of 28 inches.

The storm is general throughout the country. At Cascade Creek the snow is 17 inches deep. At Ukiah the temperature is 22 degrees below zero, and motor trucks are having hay from back to the stock in the Ukiah country.

Light quality of the snow is causing some anxiety among stockmen as it is of the variety that sticks to the hide of cattle, causing considerable discomfort. The stockmen had hoped that the deep snow would not fall before Christmas, and the early storm is somewhat unexpected. However, it is estimated that stock will not suffer from hay shortages, as many eaters will eat in anticipation of a long hard winter.
