**LOS ANGELES WILL NOT ACCEPT UNION TEACHERS**

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 11.—Resolutions adopted by the board of education insisting that all propaganda for the formation of a union among teachers of the Los Angeles schools shall cease and requiring that all teachers affiliated with the American Federation of Labor shall give up their mem-

bership or leave the teaching staff are on file here today. The resolution was taken today as an ultimatum, and a threatened serious breach in school circles with probably a "strike" is imminent, it is said. Reports vary as how thoroughly organized the teachers are. Union sources claim a majority organization. Board of education members minimize and are inclined to regard their ultimatum as the death blow to unionism in the schools.

**OPERATION OFFERS NEW FUTURE FOR GENIUS, BELIEF OF SURGEON**

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11.—The interstitial gland operation, which has been made famous by experiments at San Quentin prison, offers a new lease of life to genius, declared Dr. Victor G. Veckl, well-known surgeon. Broken down and worn-out men of genius can be rejuvenated, according to Veckl, and their genius restored to vigor. He predicts great things for the gland operation. Men like Padreschi, who are aging, he stated, could be restored to their former vigor.

**G. O. P. WILL MEET IN CHICAGO ON JUNE 28, CAMPAIGN IS MAPPED**

Committee Resembling Industrial Commission Will Sit Continuously Until Convention, Drawing up Platform.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The republican convention will be held in Chicago on June 28.

Plain Platform Committee WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Details of plans for a "campaign of efficiency" were made by the republican national committee at a meeting here yesterday. The committee, Chairman Hays announced, authorized the appointment of a platform conference with many of the characteristics of an industrial commission to sit continuously from now until the convention, when it will make a report.

The report will embody suggestions regarding platform plans, based on six months study of national problems. The committee will be composed of 12 members of the national committee and a large number of other Republicans, representing all groups of interests, farmers, labor, business, etc. There probably will be 50 members including chairmen of senatorial and congressional committees, well as congressmen. The organization will be divided into small groups to cover the whole country, and make reports to a central co-ordinating body, which will draw up a platform of recommendations.

**BAKER LUMBER MILL SHUTS DOWN DUE TO SHORTAGE OF CARS**

Eccles Co. Paralyzed, Remainder of Industry Must Follow Unless Relief, Unlikely in Coal Crisis, Comes Today.

BAKER, Dec. 11.—Baker's lumber industry entered a state of paralysis Tuesday when the Eccles Lumber company ceased operation at noon and the remaining three mills announced that their plants will close within the next two or three days unless relief from the car shortage arrives today. Local railway officials said that, in view of the storm and coal situation, no such relief is probable.

The Standard Lumber company, whose planer had been closed two days for repairs, will be unable to resume operations Wednesday morning as intended. The Baker white pine planer will close Wednesday, and the Oregon Lumber company reports that, by loading platforms and sheds already nearly full, its planer can operate until no later than Thursday. All of the mills have been compelled to curtail their output for more than a month, but today the car situation became more acute than at any time this year. Nearly 200 men will face unemployment in Baker if the mills are shut down.

**CHEHALIS ORDINANCE WOULD BAR DANCERS NOT 21 YEARS OLD**

CHEHALIS, Wash., Dec. 11.—Public dances in Chehalis will be taboo to anyone under the age of 21 years in the future, according to the terms of an ordinance introduced at the city commission meeting yesterday if it should be passed. Private dances are not included in the proposed restriction.

The ordinance was prepared by City Attorney Danahoe at the request of the city commission. Anyone under 21 who is caught in a poolhall or public cardroom, or who has in his or her possession any form of tobacco, revolver, toy pistol or ammunition, is also subject to a fine of from \$10 to \$100, both for the minor thus offending and for the owner of the poolhall or other resort.

**GOLDMAN DEPORTATION DECISION IS UPHELD**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Justice Brandeis of the supreme court refused to overrule action of the lower federal courts in the case of Alex Berkman and Emma Goldman, anarchist leaders who are fighting to prevent their deportation to Russia.

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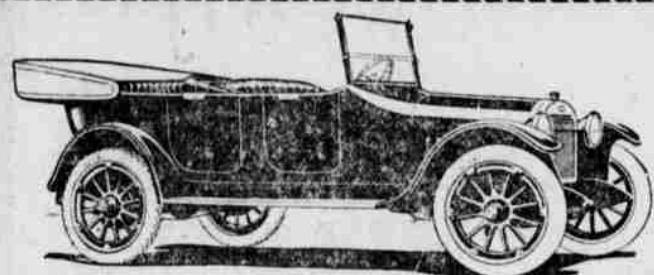
