NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

Mrs. Payant Left \$9994 Estate.
 The estate left by Mrs. Eleanor Cameron Payant, formerly of Weston, was appraised today at \$9994.57, in an inventory filed by James Schrimmer, Barney Foster and H. A. Street.

Peringer Appraisers Named.
 W. R. Wyrick, F. S. LeGrow and H. E. Kirkpatrick were today appointed appraisers of the estate of George E. Peringer. H. W. Collins and W. S. Ferguson, joint executors, today filed bond in the sum of \$200,000, with M. L. Watts, F. S. LeGrow, Sophie Myers McCanna and Frank Carl as sureties.

Umatilla Votes Standard School.
 Voters of school district No. 6 at Umatilla this week voted to establish a four year standard high school in place of the high school course now being given there. The schools at weeks because of diphtheria but hope to be reopened Monday, according to notice received by the county superintendent today.

No Objections to Budget.
 Although yesterday was the date set by the county court for the hearing of objections to the proposed 1920 budget, there was none present to remonstrate. The county commissioners have now to await word from the state tax commission regarding the amount of state tax due from this county before finally submitting the budget to the clerk of the court.

C. S. T. A. Delegates Named.
 Three county delegates to the Oregon State Teachers' Association convention which will be held in Portland from December 29 to 31, inclusive, have been named, according to W. W. Green, county superintendent. Those from Pendleton and Milton are yet to be announced. The delegates chosen so far are: Howard Drew of Echo; P. C. Fitzpatrick of Weston; and Miss Dorothy Bedwell of near Pilot Rock.

Outley Estate Admitted.
 The estate of James Outley, who was found dead in his cabin on Camas Prairie Wednesday, was admitted to probate today. J. T. Brown was appointed administrator with bond at \$1000. The deceased left \$1200 in real property and \$250 in personal property. A. S. Quant, George Ness and John Endicott were appointed appraisers.

Two County Schools Close.
 Schools in districts No. 84, near Cold Springs reservoir, and No. 86, near Ring, was closed yesterday afternoon because of the extreme cold in those districts. At the Cold Springs school the temperature was 22 below zero, according to Miss Lenora Dunlap, teacher, who is in town today on her way home to Corvallis. She will spend the holidays there and not reopen school until after January 1. Miss Edith Byrnes, who is teaching the Ring school, came home today and will remain with her parents here until conditions are such that classes can be resumed.

Sue on Breach of Contract.
 Snow & Dayton today filed suit against James C. Daniel to recover \$1000, which, they allege, was promised them as commission should they find a buyer for the outfit and lease on the place under lease to Daniel. The plaintiffs allege that the defendant placed a value of \$25,000 on the transaction and later reduced it to \$22,500, giving his pledge not to sell under that figure. The plaintiffs, they aver, were promised \$1000 if they found a buyer. J. C. McKee of Helix was put in touch with the defendant, who, the plaintiffs allege, completed a deal with McKee for \$12,500. They ask judgment for the \$1000 together with interest from September 15, 1918. They are represented by Peterson, Bishop & Clark.

CHRISTMAS SEES LACK OF TOYS FOR MEXICO; NOVELTIES FAVORITES

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 12.—The approach of Christmas finds a dearth of toys in Mexico with no apparent means for greatly increasing the supply. In former years Germany has provided unlimited number of gimcracks which found ready sale here, but this source of supply was closed by the war. Other countries have been slow in entering this field of industrial activity. United States manufacturers have shown intentions of putting their toys on the market here but the goods have not arrived in appreciable quantities.
