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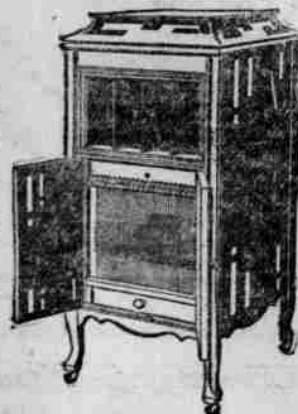

COLLEGE GIRL SAVES CHILD FROM INJURY UNDER SPEEDING CAR

Evelyn Capell, Freshman at Reed Spies Youngster Toddlng in Snow, Snatches it to Safety, Escapes Wheels.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—Evelyn Capell, a Reed college freshman, saved one Portland auto owner from the accident column Wednesday when she acted the heroine in a near tragedy. Miss Capell was waiting for the Sellwood car on Hawthorne avenue when she spied a youngster toddling through the snow into the path of a fast approaching car. The brakes were clamped on, but the automobile could not stop.

Miss Capell snatched the child to safety, but fell herself, and she barely managed to roll toward the sidewalk to escape the car's wheels. The driver stopped and tried his best to discover the name of the heroine, but Miss Capell was not looking for publicity, and the story only slipped out when she confessed the incident to friends at the Reed dormitory. Miss Capell is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry T. Capell of 875 East Twenty-third north.

BODY OF PASCO FIRE VICTIM IS RECOVERED

PASCO, Wash., Dec. 12.—The body of Roy Van Nest has been recovered from the ruins of the Pasco drug store destroyed by fire. It was in the basement. The condition of the body leads to the belief that the boy was instantly killed by the explosion, as the head was badly crushed as if it had been thrown violently against the wall. No announcement has yet been made as to funeral arrangements.
