MATHEWS MURDER MYSTERY UNSOLVED; CLUES ARE MEAGER

Police Inspectors Still Unable to Untangle Situation Due to Failure of Army Officials to Co-operate.

PORTLAND, Dec. 13.—Police inspectors were still unable Thursday to untangle the mysterious murder of Private Mark Mathews Monday night at Eleventh and Main streets owing to the failure of army officials to co-operate. Captain of Inspectors Circle

received a long distance call from Camp Lewis stating that the men could not be returned to Portland before December 15, while the commanding officer at Vancouver barracks, said they would be ordered back immediately.

Captain Circle is now trying to find out "who's who" among camp commanders to ascertain how soon he can expect cooperation. The police fear any information the non-commissioned officers might give when they return from Corvallis will be so "cold" that it will be of little value. Police are now confident that the two men with Mathews were companions of the murderer and not friends of the murdered soldier.

LYCEUM COURSE WILL BRING THREE NUMBERS; W. H. TAFT TO SPEAK

Six Hundred and Fifty Tickets to be Put on Sale Monday; Bertha Farnor Co. and Arthur Wayne Evans Coming.

Final plans for the sale of the season tickets for the High School Lyceum Course were completed yesterday. The tickets, which will sell for \$1.50 each, will admit the purchaser to the three numbers of the course, namely William Howard Taft, The Bertha Farnor Company and Arthur Wayne Evans. A date will be announced later, at which time 50 cents of the season ticket may be presented at Thompson's drug store to obtain for the holder reserved seats for the first two numbers. These two numbers will be held at the high school assembly. Ex-president Taft will appear at Happy Canyon and no seats will be reserved.

Monday is the day set for the opening of the campaign, which will be conducted in connection with a class contest at high school. Parents and students are urged to buy their tickets early as only 650 season tickets will be sold and it is desired by the promoters of the scheme that school patrons receive full benefit of the entertainment which will be provided.

The freshmen class of Pendleton high school has been showing activity in many of the student body activities and according to Ben Simonton, president of the class, they intend to elect their candidate queen, in the lyceum contest. Thelma Dupuis was the chosen candidate for "queen" at a meeting held Thursday evening by the "rooks." Monday, the numerous members of the class plan to rush the town and sell their quota of lyceum tickets before the other classes get started. The other classes of the high school also plan strenuous campaigns. The main idea of the contest is to sell the lyceum tickets.

Will Resume Practice
The girls of the high school will resume basketball practice next week. A team will be chosen, by Miss Catharine Morgan, the coach, and a heavy schedule will probably be arranged. Double header games will probably be scheduled with several of the larger Eastern Oregon towns.

WASHINGTON MINERS WILL AWAIT ORDERS

ELLIENSBURG, Wash., Dec. 13.—Coal miners of the Cle Elum-Roslyn fields near here, will not return to work until a general convention of the United Mine Workers of America orders the men to end the strike, according to telephone messages received here from Cle Elum. The Cle Elum and Roslyn fields are the largest in Washington.

Announcement of the plans of the miners to remain on strike was made by Charles Wilkinson, president of the Cle Elum-Mine Workers local, the telephone message said. Mr. Wilkinson said he spoke for the miners of both Cle Elum and Roslyn.

No Instructions Yet
SEATTLE, Dec. 13.—Striking Washington coal miners have not yet received instructions from Indianapolis to return to work, Robert B. Marlin, Seattle president of District No. 39 United Mine Workers of America said here today.

Mr. Marlin said that when the instructions are received the Cle Elum and Roslyn miners unions probably will order their members back to work. He said he had heard nothing of an organized attempt at Cle Elum and Roslyn to keep the miners out.

HERMISTON TO MAKE MOLASSES PRODUCT

HERMISTON, Dec. 13.—C. S. McNaught has just received machinery for the erection of a 25-ton molasses alfalfa meal of the Shadybrook brand and will install the plant immediately in connection with his large alfalfa mill here. He will ship molasses from the St. John's plant in Portland and distribute it to farmers here and also manufacture the molasses meal product for shipment throughout the inland empire.

This is a new product that is being highly recommended by the agricultural college and is being used by the best dairymen and feeders throughout the northwest. The mixture is made under heavy steam pressure.

The molasses is shipped from the Hawaiian Islands in shipload lots to Portland where it is being distributed and the price of the product is very reasonable. Mr. McNaught has been manufacturing alfalfa meal and chopped alfalfa for several years and will now enlarge his plant for the handling of the new business.

WILL CONSIDER PARDONS
WALLA WALLA, Dec. 13.—The board of control will meet at the penitentiary as a board of pardons Dec. 15. This will take the place of the January session. At the last session of this board W. L. Collier, Seattle banker, who was sentenced to five to 15 years for embezzlement, was paroled and Warren Drum stated that Collier has gone to California.



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OVERCOATS WANTED FOR EX-SERVICE MEN

MAY CALL OUT COUER D'ALENE WOOD CHOPPERS

WALLACE, Idaho, Dec. 13.—With temperature ranging from zero to an official registration of 7 below during the last 24 hours, the Couer d'Alene district is suffering. This condition added to the daily decreasing supply of coal, is causing considerable concern and unless a favorable change in

the weather takes place soon there will be actual suffering. Situated in the heart of Couer d'Alene forest it will be necessary soon to call for wood-choppers to supply fuel. A strong easterly wind is adding to the intensity of the cold.
