PACIFIC COAST STATES MEET DIFFICULTY IN PLACING ARMY MEN

Pacific coast states and the far west generally are having difficulty in placing all of their discharged service men in suitable jobs, according to a report made public today by Major General William C. Haan, head of the war department's employment activities in Washington.

In 21 cities of this district during November, 7172 men registered for work and 4913 found jobs. San Francisco alone shows a large proportion of this unemployment. Owing to a strike of ship yard workers which is on in this city, registrations have been unusually heavy—2293 seeking employment and 633 placed.

Spokane Outlook Better.
In Spokane, Wash., the outlook is much better, with 558 placed at work during the past three weeks, as against 594 new men registering during the same period. In this city the American Legion in addition to rendering enthusiastic aid in placing service men at work, has been actively engaged in combating the radicals.

Portland, Ore., reports the situation as good, with 831 men finding work out of 931 applying, while in Salem it is reported that there are practically no service men unemployed. Pocatello, Ida., is also showing up well with 29 men placed in three weeks, while only 15 new men registered during the same period.

Bellingham 100 Per Cent.
In Phoenix, Ariz., the American Legion was able to put 12 men at work and at the same time only 10 new men registered. Figures from Salt Lake City, Utah, are not so encouraging, as 127 men registered and but 23 were put at work. On the other hand Bellingham, Wash., shows a clean slate with 77 men looking for work and 77 men placed.

Throughout the entire country for the past four weeks in 124 cities, 41,321 ex-fighters have applied for work, as against 47,546 four weeks ago. However, during November but 29,375 men have found employment, as against 41,548 in October.

"It is very evident," says General Haan, "from the large number of registrations which have come in during the last four weeks, that there is a pressing necessity for continued activity in the bureau which assist discharged service men in obtaining jobs. I hope every employer will do everything possible to provide all our soldiers and sailors with a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year."
