PATIENT FLEES IN PAJAMAS FROM ST. LOUIS HOSPITAL

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 27.—City hospital officials are speculating as to how a patient who said he was Harry Parks, 20 years old, of 5444 Kennerly avenue, fared after he departed from the hospital yesterday clad only in a suit of flannel hospital pajamas and a pair of cloth slippers.

Parks disappeared from his ward shortly after an operation for the removal of an abscess on his left arm. His clothing is still at the hospital.

Physicians said that he applied for treatment Tuesday. The abscess they declare was the result of the continued use of a hypodermic needle for injections of morphine, to which the patient was addicted. Fear was expressed that Parks would aggravate his condition as a result of his flight in cold weather and the lack of continuous treatment following the operation.

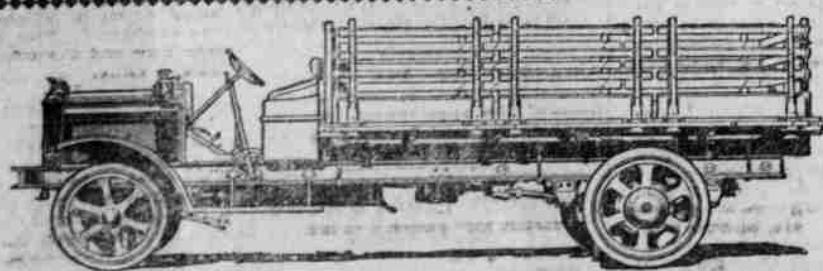
CENSUS ENUMERATOR INJURED BY TIMBER
