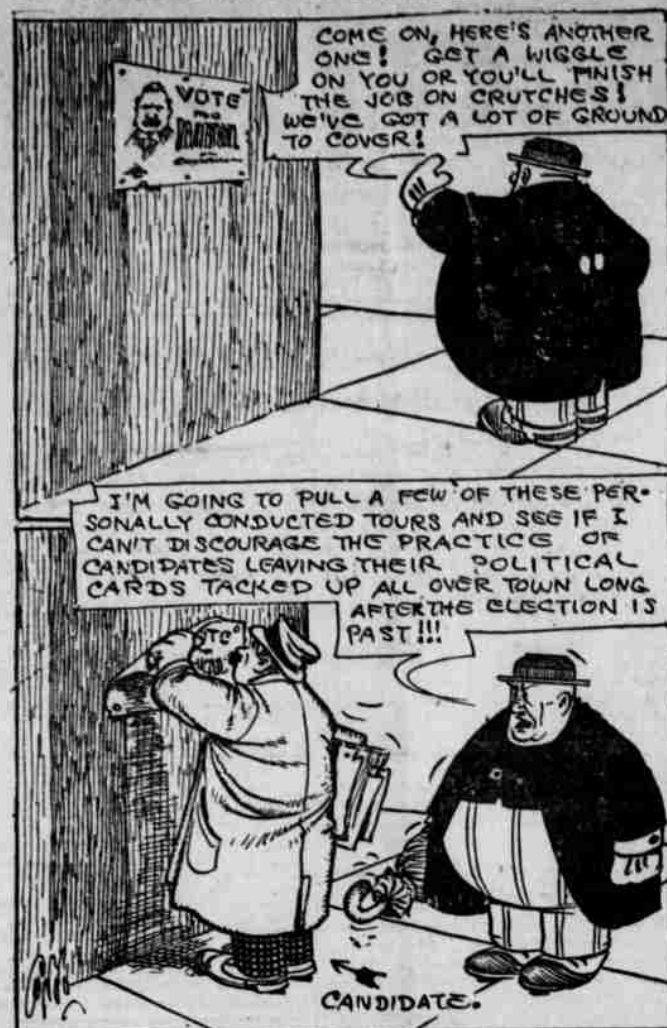

BRITISH NOBILITY IS
"GOING BROKE," SAYS
LONDON NEWSPAPER

LONDON, Jan. 1.—English nobility is "going broke." The "new poor" is the phrase invented by the Daily Mail to describe members of the peerage who have been left in a bad way

financially by the war.
"In the hunting shires of Leicestershire and its neighborhood there is ample evidence of this poverty," says the Daily Mail. "The countryside is littered with big, empty houses and empty stables."
"The nobles are too poor to hunt, and the old-time safety of these provincial districts is now all gone. The old 'hunting crowd' has been hard hit by taxation. The cavaliers who were the life of the hunting field are dead or vanished. Their friends have not the heart to return. The foreigners, Italian steeplechasers, Belgian millionaires and Austrian nobles are seen no more. The 'new rich' who have nibbled at the empty houses are frightened off by the big stables. They do not hunt and they fear the expense of maintaining the establishments would be too great."

CHINESE MERCHANT
BURNS JAPANESE
GODS IN BOYCOTT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1.—Japanese gods, ebony furniture and other goods valued at \$1000 were burned to night in the main street of San Francisco's Chinatown by Quong Chung, a Chinese merchant, as a public protest against the Japanese occupation of Shantung and also, he said, as a first attempt to extend the Chinese boycott against Japanese goods to the United States.

Several thousand Chinese turned out to witness the spectacle, and two students made speeches. The goods were ordered by Quong Chung several months ago in Japan, but had just been released from the custom house. Suggestions that he sell the merchandise and give the proceeds to charity were met by him with the reply that a demonstration against the Japanese was necessary.

"This is—how shall I call it in American? Oh, yes, it is a stunt to put jazz into the boycott," he said.

STATE LAND BOARD
MAY INVEST SCHOOL
FUNDS AT INTEREST

SALEM, Jan. 1.—The state land board will invest approximately \$200,000 state school funds in bonds drawing not less than 5 per cent interest in the event the recommendations of G. G. Brown, clerk of the land board, are carried out.

Although Mr. Brown says quite a number of applications for loans are being received, a large number of mortgages held by the state have been liquidated and there now remains in this fund about \$248,000.

In connection with Mr. Brown's recommendations it was explained that should any of the balance now on hand be invested in bonds it could be converted into cash should an emergency demand.
