Cupid Busy in Final Month.

This is a better showing than was made in the month of June and crowded September for licenses. Books in the clerk's office show that 229 couples were granted marriage licenses during the year just passed.

Two Couples Take Licenses.

The final marriage licenses of 1919 were issued yesterday afternoon by County Clerk Brown to two local couples, Elliott C. Nelson and Miss Cornelia Morton, of Pendleton, had theirs dated for December 31 and next Wednesday night, however.

were married immediately after, to start the new year in double harness. Enoch Carl Friedly and Miss Helen M. Whitmore were licensed to wed today, their license having the distinction of being the first in this county to be dated January 1, 1920.

100 Dogs Issued Licenses.

At the close of business yesterday afternoon the county clerk's office had received and filed applications for 100 state dog licenses. The collars have all been made up and will be in the mails tomorrow. The dog tax law requires that the animals wear their collars at all times, as the collars bear a leather tag with the animal's number. Making of the tags has required the installation of a small-sized machine shop in the clerk's office, which is operated by Deputy Clerk Cyril Proebstel. During the present month applications are expected for several hundred licenses as the law provides for the destruction of unlicensed animals found after 30 days.

22 OF FOREIGN BIRTH SEEK FINAL PAPERS

Twenty-two men and women of foreign birth are on the list to be examined for final citizenship papers on Saturday, January 10, before Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps. Naturalization examiners W. W. Tompkins will be here to question the applicants.

Four citizens of Germany are among the applicants for United States citizenship. All of them have been carried over from previous hearings and are confident that their petitions will be granted and citizenship conferred. The four who will represent the present government in Germany are: Gustav Adolf Muller, Edward Karl Luesegang, John Jacob Kellere and Martin Conrad.

Eleven subjects of George V. emperor of all the Britains, are applying for citizenship. Of this number five give Ireland as their birthplace, four claim Canada, one claims Scotland and one, England. Of the Canadian applicants, one, Frank Oscar Waldman, was born an American citizen, went to Canada and was naturalized there, and has since returned to seek American citizenship. William Martin is the one Englishman and James Best the one Scotswoman in the list. The Canadians, beside Mr. Waldman, are: Oliver Graham Lee, James Leo and August Klone. The Irish applicants are: James Henry Wilson, Patrick Monaghan, Michael Grant, Bernard Kenny and Elizabeth Hall Taylor.

Greece furnishes four would-be citizens, including John Paliogiannis, Spiros Halaehras, Peter Saranto and Christ Toun. Dragan. Sweden is represented by Henry John Anderson, Switzerland by John Meyer and Denmark by Arthur Christian Jensen.

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Roast Leg of Pork.
The pork should only be eaten in cold weather. This recipe makes a fine Sunday roast. Cold, it is also delicious.
Put into the bottom of the roasting pan a sliced carrot, 1 onion, 3 bay leaves, 6 cloves, a spoonful of pepper berries and a stalk of celery. Season the leg with salt, pepper and a little sage. Set on top of vegetables and roast. Baste well. When done, take out pork, skim fat off the gravy, add 1 cup bouillon, 1 tablespoon meat extract, strain and season and serve in a gravy boat.
