MEDFORD BURGLARS MAKE BIG RAID ON BUSINESS SECTION

MEDFORD, Jan. 1.—Burglars made a raid on the business section of the city between 6 o'clock Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning, breaking into a dozen stores by cutting rear windows and forcing doors. In several stores merchants were invoicing when they heard the bold marauders breaking in, but no one was able to see them. Small sums of money were obtained by them from cash registers and money drawers, but no safes were molested.

Among the places broken into were the Crater Lake company and Garnett hardware stores, the Wonder store, Warner, Wortman & Cores grocery, Peckless bakery, Treichler Auto company store and the Star and Economy meat markets. The Crater Lake Hardware company was twice broken into between 6 and 9 o'clock, and the burglars narrowly escaped capture on their second visit. The Independence creamery office was also visited. At Garnett's hardware store the burglars tried to jimmy the safe open.

NAVY CHAPLAIN KILLED IN ELEVEN STORY FALL

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 30.—The Rev. Edward B. Henry, a Catholic priest, was killed Thursday when he fell or leaped from a window of a room on the eleventh floor of a leading hotel. He was a chaplain in the navy with the rank of lieutenant and pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church, Winthrop, Me.

Father Henry came from St. Louis that morning with his mother. They joined Mrs. Vincent Kerens, of No. 11 East Eighth-third street, New York, the priest's sister, at the hotel. Father Henry was a son of the late Edward B. Henry, a prominent New York lawyer, and was forty-one years old. He had recently returned from France, where he broke down because of overwork. A visit to the seashore had been planned and his relatives were going with him to Atlantic City, where it was hoped a complete rest would restore him to health.

The party left their rooms at the hotel to take an afternoon train to the resort. Father Henry, on the plea that he had overlooked something, returned to the rooms and his mother and sister proceeded to the main floor. They saw a great crowd gathered about the main entrance and were horrified to learn that the son and brother had leaped or fallen from a window. In falling he crashed thru the canopy over the entrance. He was alive when picked up, but died in a few moments.

His sister told the Coroner he had done valiant service during the influenza epidemic and finally contracted the malady. His health had been bad ever since, and recently he had

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been at the Sacred Heart Sanitarium, Milwaukee.

Mrs. Kerens told the Coroner her brother was subject to attacks of vertigo. She believed, she said, he had fallen from the window while ill. She did not regard it as a case of suicide. He had gone back to the rooms, she testified, to get his overcoat. The rooms were warm, and his mother and sister told the priest to open a window as soon as he entered, Mrs. Kerens testified.
