EVANGELINE BOOTH SALVATION ARMY IN "FIRES OF FAITH"

Big Photoplay Filmed With Fine Results in New York and in California.

Under the direction of Edward J. Ross the big production, "Fires of Faith," the splendid Salvation Army picture, produced by the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation was started in California and finished in New York. THRILLING SCENES AROUND IN DUSTIN FARNUM'S PICTURE

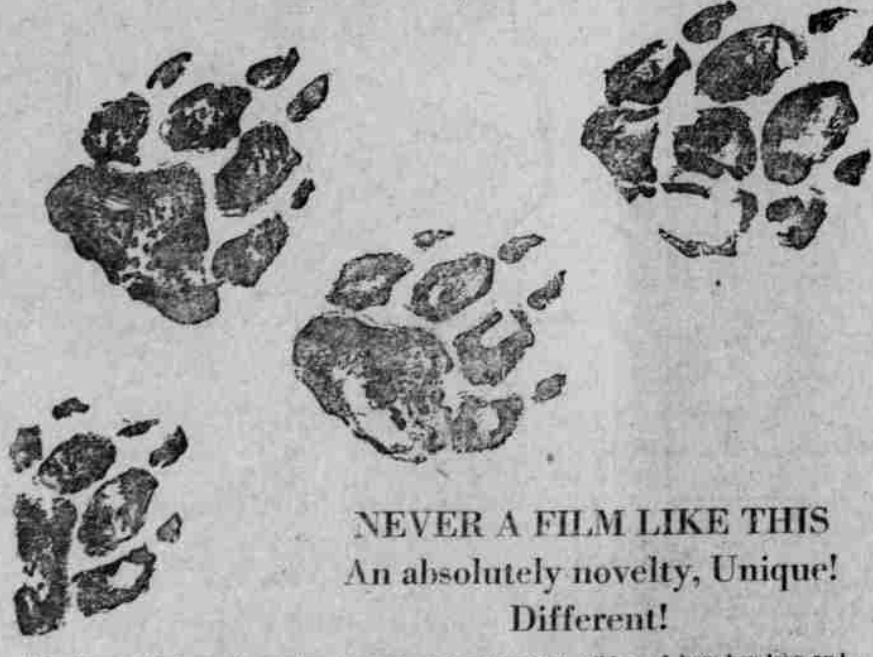
