

MEMBERS OF GAME, FISHERIES COMMITTEES IN SALEM CONFERENCE

Governor Calls Meeting to Submit Recommendations for Segregation of Commercial and Sportsmen's Interests.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 5.—(By United Press)—Members of the fisheries and game committees of the senate and house of the state legislature came to Salem today for a conference with Governor Olcott.

The executive called the committee members together for a discussion of the fish and game problem. He will submit to them the recommendations which he intends to make to the special legislative session which opens a week from today. Among other pro-

posals will be a recommendation for the segregation of the commercial and sportsmen's interests. Olcott has announced that unless the legislature creates separate fish and game commissions, he will ask for the resignations of the present joint commissioners and appoint two new commissions.

TWO KILLED AND MANY INJURED IN WRECKS IN MIDDLE WESTERN STATES

ELGIN, Ill., Jan. 5.—Two men were killed and another injured today when a eastbound third rail train crashed into a Great Western freight car at Prince Crossing, 16 miles south of here.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Jan. 5.—Several passengers were injured early today when a Chicago and Great Northern train was wrecked near Savannah, Mo., 18 miles north of here. Five coaches were derailed.

IRRIGATION CONGRESS INTERESTS UMATILLA COUNTY LAND OWNERS

Session Will Begin Thursday Morning in Portland; J. T. Hinkle to Give Address Explaining Salt Lake Conference.

Prominent owners of irrigated lands in Umatilla county will attend the ninth annual session of the Oregon Irrigation congress which opens Thursday morning in the Chamber of Commerce, Portland. Jay H. Upton of Prineville, is president.

Meetings will last three days, the final number being a smoker in honor of delegates and members of the legislature to be given by the Portland Press club in the Elks building at 8 p. m. Saturday.

Legislation affecting state guarantee of interest on irrigation and drainage district securities, the Salt Lake plan of obtaining \$250,000,000 for aid of western reclamation projects and the progress of irrigation in Oregon, will be features of the sessions.

J. T. Hinkle, of Hermiston, a member of the federal committee of the congress, is the only Umatilla county man listed on the program as a speaker. He will deliver an address Thursday afternoon explaining "The Salt Lake Irrigation Conference, Its Spirit, Purpose and Plan."

The convention will take up irrigation from all angles, including the legal factors in formation of districts, government program for irrigation, the part irrigation is to play in the development of the state and features of proposed districts.

Besides Mr. Hinkle, the following Umatilla county men are officers or committeemen of the congress: James Kyle, Stanfield, vice president; E. P. Dodd, Hermiston, member of the legislative committee; Frank Spinning, Echo, member of the program committee.

11 OF I. W. W. BAND GO ON TRIAL FACING CHARGE OF MURDER

One Alleged Ringleader in Centralia Massacre Lies in Unnamed Grave; Prosecution to Show Plot Plan.

MONTESANO, Wash., Jan. 5.—(United Press).—Charged with the first-degree murder of four members of the American Legion at Centralia, Wash., during the Armistice Day parade last November 11, eleven I. W. W. members were to go on trial here today.

Four of the prisoners, Loren Roberts, 21; Roy Becker, 24; Britt Smith, 37; and Mike Sheehan, 69, have made alleged statements to officials confessing their part in the armistice day plot and its execution, and implicating the other seven defendants; as follows:

Bert Bland, John Lamb, James McIneray, Eugene Barnett, Elmer Smith, O. C. Bland and Bert Faulkner.

One in Unmarked Grave.

Wesley Everest, one of the alleged ringleaders of the industrialists who are said to have planned the killings at Centralia, instead of being a defendant today, lies in an unmarked grave at Centralia.

Everest was taken from the Centralia jail the night following the murders by a mob of enraged ex-service men and was hanged from a bridge near the city. Cut down the next night, the body was dragged through the streets of the city and then left in the jail, within sight of the I. W. W. prisoners as a gruesome object lesson.

Will Show Premeditation.

Undertakers of Centralia and vicinity refused to touch the body. Members of the I. W. W. under guard of soldiers, were forced to dig a trench and bury the remains of Everest in it. There was no burial service.

The state will attempt to prove during the trial that the attack on the marching members of the legion was premeditated and without provocation or justification; that the plot to kill was laid two or three weeks before the tragedy; that previous to the parade, members of the I. W. W. were deliberately stationed in their headquarters in a building across the street and on a commanding hilltop overlooking the scene; that 150 shots were fired after a prearranged signal had been given; and that the parading legionnaires were unarmed.

ADMIRAL JELICOE TO VISIT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Admiral Viscount Jellicoe of the British navy, who is making a trip around the world, will arrive here Sunday from Canada to spend several days as the guest of the American navy. A round of receptions and dinners have been arranged, including a formal dinner at the British embassy Sunday night, with Counselor Ronald Lindsay, charge, as host. Secretary Daniels and many American naval officers will attend.

PLAN FOR COMPLETING PEACE NEGOTIATIONS BY JANUARY 6 ABANDONED; GERMAN EMISSARY ILL

PARIS, Jan. 5.—Signing of the protocol and final exchange of ratifications to make the treaty of peace with Germany effective, will not occur sooner than January 17, it is indicated today. The plan to complete the long peace negotiations on January 6 has been virtually abandoned. It was stated, owing to the illness of Kurt Von Lersner, German emissary, and the fact that Premier Clemenceau is on a vacation.

Interest in Paris has shifted somewhat from the treaty negotiations to Clemenceau's attitude toward accepting the presidency. Latest advice to

day said he has consented to become an honorary member of the senate but has still refused to announce whether or not he will be a presidential candidate.

Enemy to Delay Reply.

BERLIN, Jan. 5.—Germany probably will not answer the allied communication on the matter of marine materials to be delivered as compensation for the sinking of the Scapa Flow fleet, but will attempt to arrange the quantity to be surrendered in Paris before signing of the protocol. It was stated semi-officially here today.
