Auto Dealers Get Judgment.
Neil & Parker, Riverside auto dealers, today were awarded a judgment of \$22.39 from John Eggers. Frank Griggs, who was a joint defendant with Mr. Eggers, is relieved of responsibility for the judgment.

Frank Monahan Gets Judgment.
Judgment for \$1154.65, with interest and court costs, was awarded Frank Monahan from E. L. Kirk in circuit court today. A Cole 8 auto, under attachment, is to be sold to defray the judgment.

Grand Jury Still at Work.
Up to press time this afternoon the grand jury was still at work and jurors were not certain whether they would have their work completed by night. The work of the grand jury during this term has been tedious, the present session being the third in which the same jurors have served.

Sale is Confirmed.
The sale of property to M. L. Hewitt, in the case of Ruth Coburn vs. Herbert M. and Edwin B. Coburn, was confirmed by order of the circuit court today. Costs of the sale are ordered paid out of the \$500 proceeds and the remainder, \$375, is to be divided equally between the three parties to the suit.

First Suit is for Divorce.
The first action filed in the circuit court this year was a divorce complaint from Attorney George Bishop, at Freewater, today. Hollin J. McSherry is plaintiff and Mrs. Helen F. McSherry is defendant. The complaint alleges that the defendant was often cruel, called him vile names and often told him she did not love him. The couple separated on April 1, 1919.

SUPREME COURT GIVES MRS. CALDWELL \$1500

The Oregon supreme court today upheld the decision of Judge G. W. Phelps in the case of Mrs. Miriam Caldwell vs. J. T. Hoskins, wealthy stock raiser, whose auto struck her on Christmas eve, 1917, and inflicted injuries which sent her to the hospital. Word of the award was carried in a United Press dispatch from Salem.

In upholding the circuit judge's decision, Mrs. Caldwell is returned winner of the action which awarded her \$1500 damages. The case was submitted to the supreme court here last fall, the plaintiff having been represented by Haley, Haley & Stelwer.

Mrs. Caldwell was on her way home with Christmas presents when she was struck by the auto and injured, at the corner of Court and Lee streets. After she had won the suit in circuit court, the defense appealed on the ground that the plaintiff concealed the fact that an X-ray photograph had been made of the injury.

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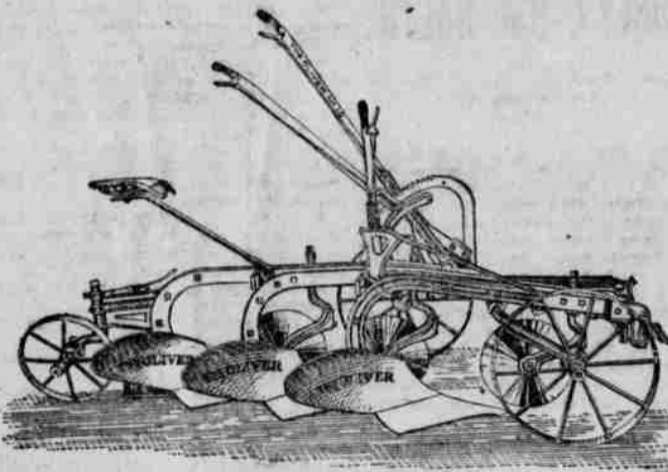

Walter Martin left Sunday morning for a few days' stay in Pendleton. Jack Casey returned home Sunday from a visit to Portland and other places along the coast.

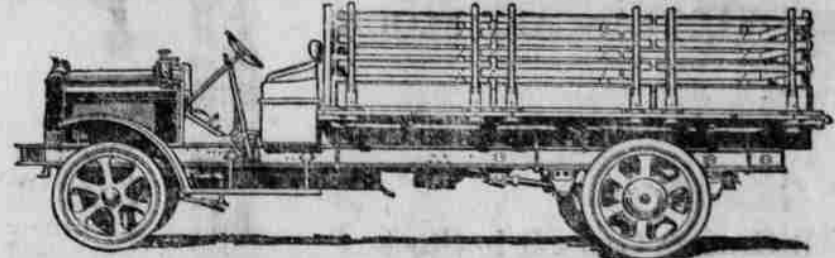
Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Cook of Hilgard were here Sunday on a short visit with Mr. and Mrs. Walters.
