past year, installed new tanks, built new offices and warehouses at a cost estimated at \$15,000. The work was completed early in the summer. W. C. E. Fruit's garage building built at a cost of \$10,000, was completed during the summer and immediately opened. The American National Bank added several offices to its second-story by a four month's remodeling, which was done at a \$10,000 cost. A greenhouse, built by Charles Despain at a cost of \$2,000, was the smallest of the industrial additions of the year.

While new building accounts for \$570,300 of the total of \$691,370 in permits issued, the remainder, \$121,070, is attributable chiefly to repairs, remodeling, the building of small garages, etc. There were 240 permits issued for such pieces of small building or repairs. In some instances the rebuilding operation was an expensive and provided two dwelling places where before there had been one. In a few instances persons remodeled old homes or wood sheds into temporary dwellings to tide them over the house shortage.

During the year the city recorder issued 325 permits, having a total value of \$691,370. September was the heaviest month, with \$155,060. This month was swelled by the \$120,000 Elks temple permit. May stood second with permits totaling \$121,735. The \$60,000 academy building and two \$12,000 residences were started in May. December, with but eight permits totaling \$1195, fell far behind any other.

No Fee For Permits
No fee is charged for a building permit in Pendleton but every piece of work within the city limits is required by ordinance to be permitted by application to the city recorder. Building permits for work within the fire limits must also be passed upon by the fire chief and the fire committee of the city council. Were a fee charged for permits here as in other cities, quite a revenue would have accrued from the 1919 business in this line.

Despite the erection of the numerous homes which were begun last year in Pendleton, the growth of population has been so rapid as to keep slightly ahead of the replacements. The prospect for 1920 is considered somewhat problematical as yet. A 27-suite apartment building, now under consideration by the Security Loan & Investment Co., probably will be under construction by March, if it is to be built. There will be quarters for a number of men provided in the completed Elks temple. At this time there are more home building organizations or persons building homes for sale than ever in Pendleton's history and the probability of their continuing operations on a large scale hinges upon cost and availability of materials and labor.

Outlook for 1920 Good.
The prosperity of Pendleton at this time is greater than at a corresponding time a year ago, according to bank deposits, and the possibility for more home building, when the season opens, is good from that viewpoint. So far there have been no permits taken for any kind of work this year.

January and December last year were the weak months, with February showing up exceptionally. The number and value of permits issued each month in 1919 follows:

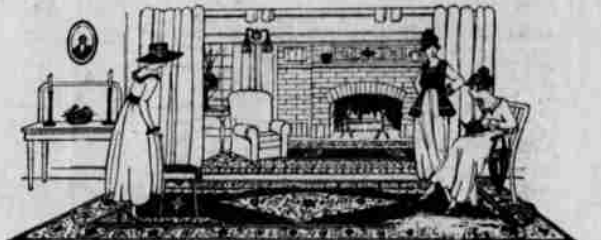
Arborists will be held here January 10, 1920. Plans for memorial tree planting will be discussed, it was said.

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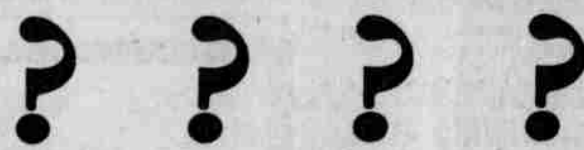
