LEGION VOTES ON 13 MATTERS OF INTEREST TO MAN WHO SERVED

Universal Military Training and Investigation of Prison Conditions Stir Spirited Debate; Membership Now 190.

Thirteen matters vitally affecting the ex-service men were voted upon by Pendleton Post, American Legion, at the January meeting held last evening in the assembly room of the county library. The propositions were proposed with recommendations by the judiciary committee.

Matters of bonuses, education for disabled service men, the alien immigration problem, settlement of public lands and other related subjects were voted upon. In every case the recommendation of the committee was concurred in, although there were spirited debates concerning the legion's stand on universal military service and demand for investigation and punishment of persons responsible for alleged bad conditions in army prison camps.

Committees reported on the dance which was held several weeks ago and on plans for future entertainment by the legion. Discussion with regard to an increase of dues was brought up but not acted upon. By action of the national convention of the legion, every legion man is required to be a subscriber of the American Legion Weekly and this subscription fee is paid out of his dues.

This, together with the amount which goes to the state organization, leaves the local post with but 50 cents per member.

There were 15 new members admitted last night, including a number who served from this city but who have since moved their residence elsewhere. The secretary announced that the membership now totals 190. The attendance last evening was light and the chairman announced that hereafter members will receive notice of the meetings by post card.

LOS ANGELES WOMAN, 119, CLAIMS TO BE OLDEST SELF SUPPORTING LADY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 6.—Elna Allen, who keeps house for herself in a little tent on the outskirts of Los Angeles, makes the claim that she is the country's oldest woman who makes her own living.

"I was born in 1900 and remember five American wars," she said today. If Mrs. Allen—who has outlived three husbands and all of her 11 children—is not mistaken about her age, she is now 119.

She makes her living selling magazines, and says she expects to sell them for another decade or two.

"What's my recipe for long life? Why the Lord has work for me to do," she said. "I have served the Lord faithfully since I was 6 years old, and I'm not through yet."

Yes, Mrs. Allen says she liked beer and wine before the country went dry—but she never smoked cigarettes.

HENRY LATOURELLE IN VENICE HAS "REGULAR AMERICAN CHRISTMAS"

Pendleton Sailor in Italy Joins 19 Others of "Pittsburg" Crew in Ordering Roast Pig-Chicken-Duck-Turkey Dinner.

A "regular American Christmas" was spent by Henry Latourelle, Pendleton boy serving in the United States Navy, in Venice, Italy, if arrangements outlined in a letter to his father, H. J. Latourelle, of this city, materialized according to schedule.

Young Latourelle, in his letter dated December 12, says that he is enjoying himself in Venice. Accompanying his letter was a picture of himself and other sailors of the U. S. S. Pittsburg, taken in front of the beautiful St. Mark's Cathedral in the historical Italian city. Following are extracts from the letter:

"There are lots of things to see and we can get good eats at reasonable prices. I get along fine with these people as I can 'habla Spanola' fairly well and I'm getting better at French all the time.

"We will be here for Christmas and I guess we'll have a good time. Twenty of us have put in \$29 apiece for a blowout. There is a fellow here who lived in Los Angeles for 13 years and he and his wife are going to fix things up for us in true American style.

Here's our menu course: Roast suckling pig, chicken, duck and turkey. The rest of the courses we leave to the Mrs. I guess we won't have a good time, eh? But it won't be home, at that.

"I may get my discharge soon. I put in for it and hope it will go through."

WALLA WALLA ENTERS STATE HERO CANDIDATE

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 6.—Sergeant Mansfield Ferrell of the United States army recruiting office here, who lived in Walla Walla several months prior to entering the army in 1917, is Walla Walla's candidate for honor as the state of Washington's greatest hero, the selection of which is to be made Monday by a board of officers assembled by Acting Adjutant General Maurice Thompson of the Washington National Guard.

Ferrell earned a commission as second lieutenant and served through the war in the 201st tank battalion, the first organization of that kind to enter the service. He served in constant liaison with the British forces, and received a citation from the British high command and the distinguished service cross for bravery in engagements with his tank. He saved the life of a brother officer by transporting him, when he was seriously wounded, to a dressing station, under fire of the enemy guns, and in addition helped take 400 yards of trenches and broke up a machine gun nest while operating the tank. Later he wrecked four pieces of motor-driven German artillery and, after his entire tank crew had been gassed, he administered first aid to them to such a condition that they could operate the tank.

MEDFORD BUSINESSMEN TELEGRAPH TO M'NARY: "FOR GOD'S SAKE RATIFY"

MEDFORD, Jan. 6.—The following self-explanatory telegram was sent to Senator Charles L. McNary at Washington last evening, signed by 19 prominent business and professional men and citizens of Medford.

"Your constituents demand ratification of peace treaty, including league covenant, without material change. People even of the backwoods country understand that the constitution and laws of the United States cannot be nullified by the action of peace committees, the president or the senate or all of them combined. They have no fear of the provisions of articles 5 and 10 or any others of the league covenant. As a whole is seems plain enough to the average person. If Senator Lodge cannot understand it, procure some juvenile writer to prepare explanations and reservations, but for God's sake, ratify the treaty."
