## REALTY TRANSFERS

**LABOR CANDIDATE IS SENT TO PARLIAMENT**  
 LONDON, Jan. 6.—Topi Myers, labor candidate was elected to parliament from the district of Yorkshire, it is announced today. His majority was 1708 votes.

## MINERS TO HEAR SETTLEMENT TERMS

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 6.—Conservative labor entered the arena against radicalism here today.  
 More than two thousand coal miners came from all parts of the country to hear details of President Wilson's basis on which their strike was settled—and to pass judgment on the settlement.  
 Approval means endorsement of the present miner's union administration headed by John L. Lewis, acting president, and William E. Green, secretary-treasurer. Disapproval means repudiation of them and a move in favor of the radical element within the organization.

**Fight to Last Ditch**  
 Lewis and Green fought "to the last ditch" to force adoption of the president's proposal at the conference of union chiefs at Indianapolis while members of "the left wing" wanted to throw the entire strength of the United Mine Workers of America into the balance to obtain their wage and hour demands.  
 The meeting today was a reconvened session of the Cleveland convention of the miners' union, which formulated demands for a sixty per cent increase in wages and a thirty hour week. Each of the 2400 delegates represented a local union.  
 It was expected that the "show-down" would come today or tomorrow with a motion for a vote of confidence in their chiefs.

Explaining the purpose of the convention today, Lewis did not touch on the political turmoil within the union. He said merely:  
**To Explain Reasons.**  
 "The only purpose of this convention is to explain to the delegates the reasons which prompted their officers in accepting the president's proposal for settlement of the strike. It is designed to promote more complete understanding among the United Mine Workers of the settlement and to secure great harmony of action among the miners and to insure maximum coal production. By harmony of action I mean a more hearty and spirited acceptance of the president's proposition."

The convention was called to order at ten o'clock in Memorial hall. First was to come an address by Lewis as presiding officer. He planned his address to include a review of the battle through the coal strike, of the federal court in junction against the strike, of the negotiations with the mine operators and the government's mediation, of the arrest of the international officers, the executive committee, the district presidents and the scale committee, and finally of the Washington conference between himself, Green and Attorney-General Palmer wherein the president's proposal was first submitted.

## CORK POLICE BOARD VESSEL, TAKING ARMS

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Officers of the United States shipping board steamer Lake Gretna today lodged a strong complaint with British officials in Cork over treatment accorded them when they reached the Irish port yesterday according to a Dublin dispatch today. It is reported that police boarded the vessel and confiscated all the officers' arms.
