WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Underwood today served notice on those working for the treaty compromise that if they do not speedily reach an agreement he will call up his resolution for a conciliation committee.

May Flight Change.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The democratic national committee, meeting here tomorrow, probably will adopt a resolution putting the party on record for ratification of the treaty as President Wilson wants it, without reservations changing the meaning, it is learned here today.

Such a resolution will be laid before the committee. Many party leaders are working for its adoption. A resolution will also commend the administration's work.

Chairman Cummings of the national committee, said it is unlikely that the rule requiring two thirds vote to nominate in the democratic convention will be changed. Considerable agitation for a change has developed.
