FOUR LADS ROB 20 HOUSES, THEN BURN TWO "JUST FOR FUN"

Tacoma Youths Establish a Lodge in Forest and Fit it With Phonograph and Wood Plus Comforts all Stolen.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 8.—How four youths, between 15 and 18 years of age, robbed 20 houses in the Boston (Wash.) postoffice and burned two houses "just for fun," was described in detail yesterday by two of the youths to W. D. Askren, prosecuting attorney.

Andrew Hansen, 18, and Joe Link, 17, who admit the leadership, are being held in the county jail, and the smaller boys are at the county detention home.

woods surrounding Tacoma, the headquarters of the boys being in a hut in the forest, where they had a phonograph, food and other comforts, all stolen.

While Ross Petrie listened to the tale, the older boy described how he had burned Petrie's summer home.

"We climbed inside and set fire to the curtains with a match," said one of them. "We thought it would be fun to see it burn."

Definite charges have been withheld until deputy sheriffs have completed unearthing all the caches and assembling the loot.

MAUDE POWELL PASSES IN FORTIETH YEAR OF VIOLIN CONCERT WORK

American Musician Began Career as Child and Played Her Fame Into Hearts of Thousands as "People's Violinist."

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—News of the death of Maude Powell, who was universally regarded by critics as the world's most talented woman violinist, was received with regret in musical circles which had closely followed her career for more than 40 years in concert. The violinist died yesterday in a hotel at Uniontown, Pa., after a nervous breakdown, suffered Wednesday.

Maude Powell was in her fifty-second year, and had given thousands of concerts in the United States and Europe since she first attracted attention as a child prodigy in the middle west. She was born in Peru, Ill., and at the age of 13 went abroad to study in Leipzig, Paris and Berlin.

Mother Hungarian Composer
Miss Powell's father was a literary man, lawyer and politician and was of English-Welsh extraction, while her mother, a Hungarian, was a gifted musical composer. The Powell family afterward moved to Aurora, Ill., where Maude Powell began her musical education. Four years of music study with William Lewis of Chicago and occasional concert appearances developed so rapidly her gift as a violinist that she was taken to Leipzig, Germany, where she became a violin student with Professor Sobradieck.

At the end of 1881, Miss Powell received a diploma at the public music examinations held at the Gewandhaus, and on proceeding to Paris, France, in competition with 30 other applicants, won one of the six vacancies in Charles Dancla's famous violin class. Then she was recognized quickly as a coming great artist, and when she went to London, England, where she met Herr Joachim, the big violin star, he invited her to Berlin, Germany, where she became his personal pupil.

In Berlin Miss Powell made her debut in 1885, playing Max Bruch's "G Minor Concerto." At 22 years old Maude Powell made her European reputation as a violinist, and her subsequent world concert tours made her artistic famous. It was while playing in concert in London, England, in violin soloist with Sousa's band, that she met H. Geoffrey Turner, an English army officer. Their marriage was an ideally happy one, and the two traveled together continually wherever the violin star appeared on the road in concerts.

Maude Powell soon became esteemed by music experts as the woman violinist who plays with the big tone of a man. Her arms were unusually well developed in muscle strength for a woman, and powerful and "big" was her violin tone. Miss Powell did more than any other star violinist in playing at numerous small towns in this country, where her friendly democracy on the platform won new friends. She liked the title she thus won as "the people's violinist."

HAS BACHELOR DINNER IN GLARE OF "MOVIES"

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Friends of Arthur Loew, who is to wed Miss Mildred Zukor, daughter of Adolph Zukor, head of the Famous Players-Lasky Company, will give a bachelor dinner for him at Reisenweber's Restaurant. They have decided to make it an event typical of the "movies," as the wedding will unite two of the families most important in motion picture production and exhibition. Mr. Loew is the son of Marcus Loew, proprietor of 150 photoplay theaters.

The event will be unique. The dinner is to be given in the main restaurant of Reisenweber's, in view of other dinners, and motion pictures of the celebration will be taken by two cameras from the Paramount studios. An additional ordeal for young Loew has been provided by N. T. Frankland and others, who have written some special lyrics and topical verses to be interpolated in Jean Bodini's current revue, "Twinkle Toes," which is presented at the restaurant.

RIVERS OF FRANCE FLOOD MANY TOWNS

PARIS, Jan. 8.—The Seine has risen one foot since yesterday, and a further rise of two feet by Monday is predicted by government officials. In addition to the Seine, the Marne and other rivers are greatly swollen, with the result that parts of hundreds of towns and villages are inundated, many factories are closed, communications are cut and much of the population is forced to evacuate territory along the streams.

The government announced today that the situation was serious and would be particularly so if the predictions of rain were fulfilled.

IOWA FARMER SHOTS TWO, TAKES OWN LIFE

FOREIGNERS, OUT OF WORK, YEARN TO SEE RUSSIAN HOMELAND

Aliens Ask Mass Meeting But Mayor Baker Fears Protest Against Deportation Policy and Aids in Safer Way.

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—Alien Russians and Finns of Portland and vicinity have appealed, through representatives of the Central Labor council, to Mayor Baker for assistance in obtaining permission from federal officials to leave this country and return to any part of Russia desired.

Mayor Baker yesterday conferred with United States Attorney Humphreys, District Attorney Evans and City Attorney Evans, and it was decided that a telegram would be sent to the immigration officials at Washington to learn the rules now in effect governing such cases.

Ask Mass Meeting.
Representatives of the Russian and Finnish colonies of Portland requested the Central Labor council to arrange for a mass meeting, where the aliens might set their case before the public and create public sentiment for their hopes.

Mayor Baker is not enthusiastic over any such meeting, contending that its real purpose is to protest against the deportation of aliens who are guilty of violating the federal statutes. He said yesterday that he would be willing to aid any alien, who has been law abiding and who is now handicapped in obtaining work because of lack of citizen's papers, in leaving this country.

Foreign Element Divided
Russians and Finns who have appealed to Mayor Baker have said that it is impossible to leave the United States at the present time and that it is equally impossible to obtain work. Sentiment among the aliens who desire to leave the country is said to be divided, some favoring the soviet government of Russia and others supporting the old regime.

Until some word has been received from Washington concerning the rules now in effect, Mayor Baker says that the officials will refuse to sanction any meeting, claiming that the Russians and Finns who are protesting have no case, because they are not aware of the attitude of immigration officials.

LISTS SHOW NAMES OF EX-SERVICE MEN ENTITLED TO TRAIN

Vocational Education Offered to Two Eligible From County Among 14,000 in Country Who Have Not Yet Accepted.

Pendleton Post, American Legion, has received a circular letter and list from three National Executive Committee headquarters containing the names of ex-service men who have been approved for vocational training but have not accepted. The names of two Umatilla county men who have been approved and notified but have not sent in acceptances are in the lists they are:

Lester M. Norman, 207 Aura street, Pendleton.
Norman Russell Lee, Route 2, Echo. Nearly 50 per cent of all the men approached by the federal board for vocational training have not yet accepted, according to the circular. This means that throughout the nation there are still about 14,000 men eligible to enter training who have not done so.

Benjamin Inman, of Adams, who was approved and sent to college to take advantage of the training, is the only man in this county who was obliged to discontinue his studies.
