### Predicts Opening by March 1.

Twenty millwrights are now employed on installation of the machinery in the Collins mill and completion of the mill, ready for operation by March 1, was predicted today by R. M. Crommelin, manager. All milling machinery is on hand and the main electric motor is expected to arrive at any time from the east as it has been in transit for several weeks.

### Install New Popcorn Machine.

A latest-improved Butterkist popcorn machine was received today by the Cozy Billiard Parlor from the factory at Indianapolis and immediately put in operation. The machine is operated entirely by electricity and pops and butters corn, roasts peanuts and has a popcorn fountain, a new display feature. The machine represents an outlay of more than \$1000 and was installed today by W. E. LaMonte, of Portland, Butterkist service man.

### Business Trip to Echo.

Raymond Hatch, local architect, left today on a business trip to Echo. Mr. Hatch says that from all indications, building will begin early this spring. He says that the mounting prices are causing builders to hurry. Besides the increasing cost of lumber, other materials are becoming more expensive, he states, and cites the 7-1-2 per cent increase in the cost of radiation materials at the beginning of this month.

### Helix Has Religious Paper.

The Baptist church at Helix has started publication of a 12-page monthly called the Helix Religious Journal. It is edited by Rev. M. D. Lynn, pastor, and in its opening announcement said: "The Journal is published for the benefit of all phases of religious activity in the community. Our purpose shall be to stimulate more interest in the organized Christian activities in the community."

### City Library Report Filed.

The annual report of the city library board, presented to the city council last night, shows that the total expenses during the year 1919 were \$1008.68. During the year 56 new books were added, giving the library a total of 336 volumes. Five books were lost during the year. There were 182 borrowers listed and the circulation of books was 1141. Books taken out by adults numbered 420 and by children 721. The attendance was 1590. There are 42 magazines and a number of newspapers kept on file at the city library at this time.

### Mountain Lion Skin Arrives.

The skin of a mountain lion, six feet long, was received today at the local U. S. Biological Survey office from A. G. Ames, trapper for the survey who operates at Estacada. The skin will be sent to Washington D. C. where it will be mounted as a specimen. Mr. Ames sent also two raccoon skins to be used as specimens, and two "snow-shoe" rabbits. The rabbits are known by this name by reason of the resemblance of their feet to snow shoes. In summer the rabbits resemble the ordinary cotton tail, but in winter they become as white as the snow.
