**Regarding Rehabilitation.**  
The vocational rehabilitation law for service men has been divided into three classes, according to word received today by Miss Virginia Todd, secretary of Home Service. One class is for the men who are suffering from negligible and minor disabilities, another for men who are trying to overcome a major handicap, and another for those who can receive an award and who may secure training, tuition and books at public expense. These men will not be paid vocational pay, however. They will be enabled to attend night school, etc., and will be provided tuition.

**Crowds Greet Speaker.**  
Dr. J. W. Mahood was greeted by large audiences yesterday at the Methodist church. The two practical discourses were greatly appreciated, say those who attended. Tonight there will be a Sunday school rally at 7:30. Dr. Mahood will speak upon, "What an Earthquake Did."
