Van Orsdel Worth \$1532.
The late Peter Van Orsdel left an estate valued at \$1532.73, according to the inventory filed late Saturday by George H. Roberts, W. W. Harrah and E. E. Gervais appraisers. Real property worth \$2500 was the chief item.

School Teacher Is Bankrupt.
Giving assets of \$1050 and liabilities of \$2250, A. E. Yoder, principal of the school at Rich, was adjudged a bankrupt in the U. S. court in Portland Friday and the matter referred to Thomas Pitt Gerald, referee in bankruptcy for Umatilla county, today. No date has been set for the first meeting of creditors, none of whom are listed as being residents of the county. Two notes, aggregating \$3000, and a doctor bill of \$250 are the liabilities and the assets, an insurance policy for \$1000 and pictures and books worth \$50, are claimed exempt.

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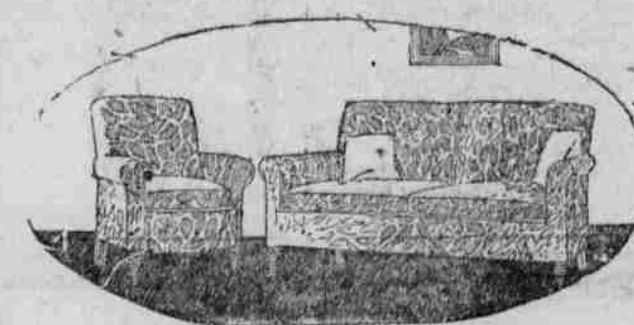
