H. B. Hanley has purchased the O. P. Brigham 40 acres for \$6000. Twenty-five acres are in alfalfa, the balance ready to seed, and one-half of the water right has been paid. ## PORTLAND'S BIRTH RECORD SHOWS GAIN OF 83 OVER 1918

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—Under the head of "vital statistics," Dr. George Parrish, city health officer, today announced an increase of 83 births in 1919 over the record established in 1918. A corresponding increase in the death rate shows 46 more deaths this year than last.  
 Following is the record this year as compared with previous years: 1919, 4810 births; 1918, 4727; 1917, 4046. The death toll in the same years shows: 1919, 3598; 1918, 3549; 1917, 2127.
