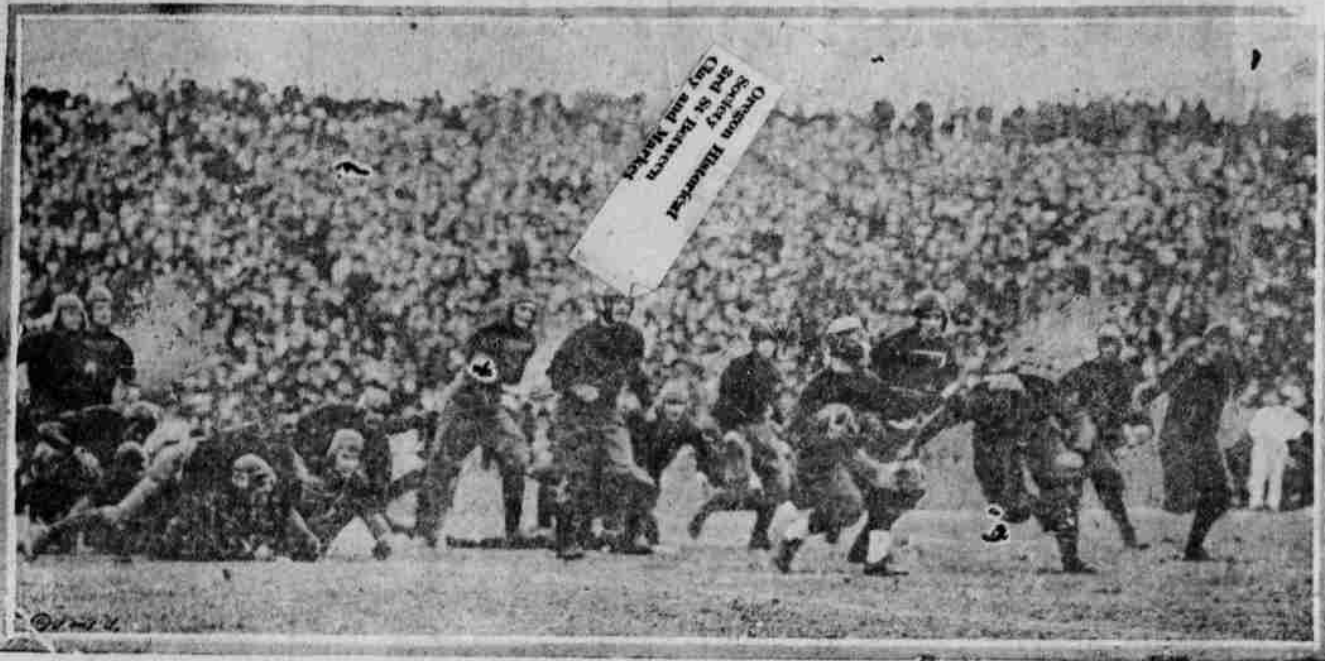


LITTLE OREGON QUARTERBACK DESPERATELY TRYING TO OVERCOME HARVARD'S ONE POINT LEAD

DO YOU KNOW

Of anyone, living anywhere in the city, who has been missed by the enumerator?

Of any people who live here but are now out of the city so could not have been seen by an enumerator?

Of any students who have their homes here but are now away attending school?

Of any one else who habitually lives in Pendleton but is now temporarily away from the city, for work or pleasure?

Of anyone who lived here on January 1, but has since left the city?

Of anyone who died since January 1?

If you know of any cases similar to those listed above keep them in mind and give the information to the volunteer Commercial Association enumerator who will call on you soon for the purpose of checking up on the census work in Pendleton with a view to securing an accurate count.

Thorough Campaign Planned.

"I am becoming enthused over this work and from information that is reaching me every day, by phone and otherwise, am convinced that it is going to be necessary if we secure a complete enumeration," said George Hartman at a meeting of the ward captains and volunteer enumerators last evening in the association rooms.

The plan of campaign mapped out by Mr. Hartman calls for a complete check not only on the missing but on those who have been enumerated. At a given time the workers in each ward will make the rounds of all houses in that ward. Aside from taking the names of those missed or believed to have been missed the Commercial Club man will write down the number of people living in each house on January 1. He will not take names or other individual data but by merely noting how many live in each house will provide a method whereby an unofficial count of the local population may be made.

The count in each ward will be made as soon as the government enumerator has completed his work in that ward. The captain of the ward will give each worker instructions when that time arrives.

The list of volunteer workers for the second ward, comprising the north side, is as follows:

District No. 4—Harold Warner. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and between Madison and Bush.

District No. 5—Ralph Howland. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and between Bush and Logan.

District No. 6—Mr. Bartlett. All houses in block north of Jackson and between Logan and Perkins.

District No. 7—J. C. Snow. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and between Perkins and Garfield.

District No. 8—W. W. Cryder. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and between Garfield and Lincoln.

District No. 9—James Neill. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and between Lincoln and Blaine.

District No. 10—Rev. Bussanberger. All houses in blocks north of Jackson and west of Blaine to city limits.

District No. 11—M. S. Kern. All houses in blocks south of Jackson and

east of Madison, to the river.

District No. 12 (A)—J. H. Gwinn. All houses south of Jackson and between Bush and Logan.

District No. 12 (B)—R. E. Morse. All houses south of Jackson and between Logan and Perkins.

District No. 13—Mr. McMonies. All houses south of Jackson and between Perkins and Garfield.

District No. 14—Mr. Chisholm. All houses in blocks south of Jackson between Garfield and Lincoln.

District No. 15—Bert Jerard. All houses in blocks south of Jackson and between Lincoln and Matlock.

District No. 16—Wm. McKinney. All houses south of Jackson and west of Matlock to city limits.

YOUNG UKIAH WOMAN
IS CALLED BY DEATH

ENLISTMENT REPLACES
EXECUTION IS CHARGE

SAN ANTONIO, Jan. 14.—Charges that Mexicans sentenced to death for outrages against Americans in Mexico were freed upon enlistment in Carranza's army were made before the full committee here in its investigation into Mexico, George Blalock, first witness, told of the killing of five members of the "Chamaly Colony" of which he was organizer. The first colonist killed, he said, was found in a wall. Three Mexicans were convicted and sentenced to be shot. Later he declared they turned up in the army. A later trial of Mexicans for killings in the colony was interrupted and taken from the hands of the civil court by military authorities. Blalock asserted, and some of the witnesses for the Americans were sentenced to be shot. They were saved by the intervention of the civil judge.

Army service is a common substitute for the death sentence, the witness charged. Ravaging by three Mexicans of the daughter of Matthew Gourd, American rancher, which occurred while Blalock was taking a herd of cattle to the ranch for delivery, drew the death sentence. The last Blalock heard of the men, however, he said, was when they were placed aboard a train for San Luis Potosi for execution.

SALEM, Jan. 14.—The 249 deportees aboard the "Soviet Ark" have been as "peaceful as lambs" officers of the transport told the United Press today. The "reds" have been "eating all they can get," but have made no disturbances and have offered no threats of what they will do when they reach Russia, the officers said. American correspondents were taken aboard the vessel Monday. There has been some dissatisfaction among the crew, it is learned. Three sailors, one of Irish and two of German birth, deserted Saturday night, apparently with the aid of a German fishing boat in the harbor.

In the temporary location the company will handle service as usual.

OLCOTT WILL RESIGN
AS STATE SECRETARY

Olcott today issued a statement saying he will resign as secretary of state as soon as it is determined who is republican nominee, following the primary to appoint a nominee as his successor. Olcott's resignation to the surface amendment was formally completed yesterday when President Vinton received his official signature to the house joint resolutions sponsored by Mrs. Thompson.

BLOODSHED RAVAGES CAPITAL:
SIEGE CLAMPED ON GERMANYCOUP AIMED AT
GOVERNMENT IS
FEARED SEQUEL

Agitation Throughout Country Mounts With Excitement Over Walkout and Red Flags Make Appearance.

SCATTERED STRAGGLERS
ROOM ALONG STREETS

Authorities Ready to Use Harsh Repressive Measures to Quell Strikers Who Have Cut Off Telegraphic Lines.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Latest reports this afternoon indicated the situation in Germany is serious but has not yet reached the gravity of a revolution. The demonstration and rioting near the reichstag was apparently inspired by independent socialists who frankly are out to overthrow the government.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Serious disorders in Berlin today resulted from the government's barricading a section around the reichstag and placing a heavy guard of soldiers there, according to a Berlin dispatch. Radical agitation throughout Germany has been increasing, partly due to the excitement attending the railway strike. The strikers succeeded in cutting off telegraphic communication from western Germany where the strike has been most successful.

Rumors that communists will take advantage of the situation to call a general strike are current. Authorities reported they are ready to use harsh methods to prevent outbreaks. The dispatch quoted a government statement admitting the situation is "critical."

The agitation began some time ago when the railway strike was declared. It was rumored that radicals planned a general outbreak, possibly with a general strike designed to overthrow the government.

The worst fighting was over at 4 but new outbreaks are feared. Scattered mobs continue to straggle through the streets. The red flag is in evidence in some quarters.

The immediate cause of the outbreak was consideration of a measure to create factory councils by the reichstag. It drew out of the radicals widespread demands for communication of industry.

Improvements totaling \$10,000 are soon to be added to the Golden West creamery on South Main street, according to announcement made by the owners today.

Modern and up-to-date machinery, which will cost approximately \$6000, has been ordered from the east and will be used for the making of butter and ice cream. The owners expect to have the machinery installed by April 1. The sum of \$4000 will be expended in improvements to the building which houses the creamery. L. S. Leach an employee of the Golden West creamery, will continue to be in charge of the manufacture of the products.

Growth in output has made the installation of the machinery necessary, say owners, who state that they hope to have the best small butter and ice cream plant in the northwest when improvements are completed.

ARMY STORE ORDERS
CARLOAD OF TOMATOES

Another carload of tomatoes has been ordered by the United States army store to meet the demand of Pendleton people. The carload is expected to arrive here soon.

The store announced today that tomorrow would be the last day of sale of goods from the store on Webb street, but the sale will continue and will be made from the cars as they arrive at the depot. Advance orders will be taken for goods in any amount, say those in charge.

Answering a criticism of the store's policy of selling goods in advance, Blaine Smith, one of those in charge, said today that the store sells in advance not only to the big buyer, but to the small buyer as well. Goods are sold in large lots to farmers, hotels and restaurants.

H. C. L. PINCH FELT BY

ROME, Jan. 14.—Employees in the Vatican today presented a memorandum to Pope Benedict demanding increased salaries to meet the high cost of living. A committee of three cardinals was appointed by the Pope to revise the wage scales.

BANK DIRECTORATE
ADDS FRANK CURL
AND H. W. COLLINS

Henry W. Collins and Frank S. Curl were added last night as directors of the American National Bank when the directorate was increased from seven to nine men. Henry Westbrook Dickson was promoted to assistant cashier to succeed Richard M. Mayberry, who recently resigned to become assistant cashier of the Inland Empire Bank here.

Both Mr. Collins and Mr. Curl are well-known in the grain business, the former as a dealer and the latter as a grower. The election of Mr. Collins as a bank director is another step in his rapid rise in financial circles in Pendleton.

Entered in 1912

Mr. Dickson is a native son of Pendleton, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Ross Dickson, who formerly lived here but now make their home in Portland. He went through the Pendleton schools, graduating from the high school in 1910. He later attended the University of Oregon for one year and in September, 1912, entered the employ of the American National, at the bottom. He has held successively all the positions up to his present station of assistant cashier.

Study Moliner, for five years a teller with the First National Bank of Portland, was elected teller to succeed Mr. Dickson and he is expected to arrive tomorrow to take up his duties. Mr. Moliner was a service man who was returned to his old position when released. He comes highly recommended by W. L. Thompson, who is a vice president of the First National Bank of Portland.

Officers Returned

All other officers and directors of the bank were returned at the election. W. L. Thompson continues as president, J. B. McCook as vice president and L. C. Scharp as cashier. F. E. Judd, L. L. Mann, Thomas Thompson and R. N. Stanfield are the other directors.

CHARLES E. HUGHES
WILL DEFEND FIVE
SUSPENDED MEMBERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—After an all night session the New York bar association, Charles E. Hughes and four other members, were chosen to represent the association in a fight for the reinstatement of five suspended socialist assemblymen. A resolution authorizing appointment of the committee and placing the association on record as opposed to the suspension of the socialists was adopted by a vote of 179 to 117 following a bitter debate of several hours.

AVIATORS REACH SALONIKI

ROME, Jan. 14.—Italian aviators who are attempting a flight from Rome to Tokyo today reached Saloniki, a message declared.

ITALY WINS LONG FOUGHT
BATTLE FOR CITY OF
FIUME AND GUARANTEES TO RAILROAD RIGHTS

LONDON, Jan. 14.—The big three today decided that Fiume will be an Italian port under the league of nations. It is declared in a Paris dispatch. Fiume hinterland, according to the dispatch, will remain Yugoslav territory but Italy will be guaranteed certain economic rights and including the use of railways.

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THRONGS PERISH
IN MOB WAR AT
REICHSTAG DOOR

Police Fling Hand Grenades With Fearful Result and Scores are Trampled Down as Bullet Storm Breaks.

PENDING LEGISLATION
CALLS DEMONSTRATION

Outbreak is Widespread and Disorders in Ruhr District and Upper Silesia Attend Strike of Railwaymen.

BERLIN, Jan. 14.—A state of siege was proclaimed today throughout Germany with the exception of Wurtemberg, Saxony and Bavaria as a result of widespread riots. Scores were killed here today in riots and over 100 men and women were injured. The fighting occurred when police and soldiers attempted to disperse a great mob in front of the reichstag building. The police used hand grenades with fearful results.

The mob gathered in response to requests for a demonstration against pending legislation in the reichstag. The meeting was orderly at first. The radical speakers inflamed the people and they attempted to rush the reichstag. Fighting followed.

Reinforcements were rushed to help the guards and machine guns were used. Many women were trampled as the crowds attempted to escape the hail of bullets. Dead and wounded littered the square in front of the reichstag. Streets and steps in front of the reichstag are smeared with blood.

Reports indicate that the outbreak is widespread. The government announced martial law has been declared in the Ruhr district and upper Silesia due to disorders attending the railway strike.

JURY RETURNS VERDICT,
THEN ASKS AMENDMENT

Prospects of a larger legal battle loom as the result of an alleged improperly worded verdict returned by the circuit court jury last evening in favor of W. L. Ebbert, defendant in an action of S. Metz & Sons vs. Mr. Ebbert. The jurors returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$1700 and today signed affidavits purporting to correct their verdict so that the plaintiff shall also receive \$1300 judgment for a note signed by the defendant, together with interest.

The jurors, so they asserted today, meant to give the plaintiffs judgment for the note and interest and to give the defendant judgment for \$1500 on his first counter complaint and \$200 on his second counter complaint. The defendant was also to be given judgment for costs. The total which would be due the defendant under this arrangement is \$22.

Judge James A. Fee, attorney for the defendant, intimated this afternoon that he will not stand for a change in the verdict without a fight. The original verdict was reported in the file and the jury discharged before the real intent was learned. Judge Phelps said today. Then they asked that the verdict be withdrawn and the amended verdict returned.
