"ALL OUT OF STEP BUT JIM"

GREAT BRITAIN, France, Italy and Japan have all ratified the peace treaty and the League of Nations is now an accomplished fact with those countries in charge of the machinery.

Each of those nations has entered the league without asking for any changes, evidently believing the plan to be fair and workable. Yet each of those nations has a self respecting national rights and national identity to sustain, just as the United States has.

Is it not strange that none of the allied statesmen discovered in the league covenant any of the destructive, seductive or soul demoralizing features that Lodge, Borah, et al, have been trying to conjure up?

How peculiar that all the world should be out of step excepting Henry Cabot Lodge and his followers in the senate?

WHAT IS MANSLAUGHTER?

ANOTHER Portlander has been acquitted of violating the traffic ordinance after having killed a little girl. Witnesses testified that the girl was dragged for a distance of 44 feet by the car in question and that the driver could not stop his car until it had gone a distance of 156 feet. Two witnesses testified that they arrived on the scene immediately after the accident and that they could smell liquor on the driver's breath.

If all that does not constitute a law violation there is something rancid much nearer than Denmark.

WONDERFUL BUSINESS

THE number of banking institutions under the supervision of the comptroller of the currency is now exactly eight thousand, including 7948 national banks in the United States, Alaska and Hawaii, and 52 savings banks, building and loan companies and trust companies in the District of Columbia. There have been chartered under the present administration, or since March 4, 1913, more than one thousand new national banks, and more charters were granted in 1919 than for any other year since 1909.

The year 1919 has been for the national banks of the country the most successful in their history. The resources and deposits of these banks have shown unprecedented growth. On the date of the November 17, 1919, call, National bank resources amounted to \$22,444,992,000, being \$829,000,000 more than ever before reported. The number of individual deposit accounts in all national banks, reported June 30, 1919, was 18,240,300, an increase of over ten million accounts in less than ten years.

Our national banks have grown more in the past six years, or say from August 9, 1913, to November 17, 1919, than they did in the entire fifty years from the inauguration of the national banking system in 1863 up to 1913.

The increases in deposits and total assets are scattered widely throughout the country. The increase in resources of the "country" banks—those national banks outside of the reserve cities—since June 30th, last, has been in excess of eight hundred million dollars. The "country" banks of Texas alone have increased in the past six months one hundred and thirty-four million dollars, or 34 per cent; in North Carolina, the increase was over \$51,000,000, or 38 per cent; in California, \$72,121,000, or 23 per cent; and in Oklahoma, \$49,929,000—30 per cent.

Ten record for immunity from failure for the twenty-two months from January 1, 1918, to the close of the last fiscal year, October 31, 1919, was thirty times or 3000 per cent better than the record for the forty years prior to 1914. There was no failure involving a dollar's loss to depositors of any national bank in the fiscal year closing October 31, 1919.

The earnings of the national banks for the past year have also exceeded all previous figures and will approximate a billion dollars gross and not far from three hundred million dollars net.

The record furnishes added testimony to the high efficiency and invaluable aid of the federal reserve system to the country's commerce, industry, agriculture and business of every kind.

Executive work should be conducted by the executive department and when this rule is not observed there is likelihood of poor service. The legislature will make a mistake if it takes the appointment of the fish and game commission out of the hands of the governor.

BLUE SKY BILL WOULD KNOCK FAKE SCHEMES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—A national blue sky bill aimed at fake stock promotion schemes was introduced by Senator Kenyon Monday. The bill provides that each concern in interstate commerce shall file a public statement with the postmaster at its legal address showing the promotion fees paid, names of underwriters, the amounts charged off to good will and the purposes for which the money will be used. Misstatements would make signers liable to prosecution for perjury, the bill provides. The statement must be attached to every bond and security sold. Kenyon declared that hundreds of stock salesmen are circulating through Iowa, and other midwestern states taking liberty bonds from farmers in exchange for worthless stocks. Many widows and working girls are sold fancy engraved stocks utterly worthless, he declared.

"MOVIE" MARRIAGES BY PHONE SUCCEED: NOT SO THIS ONE
