NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

Johnson & Sons Seek Judgment.
Suit was filed in circuit court by J. B. Johnson & Sons today against Brown Brothers to recover \$654.86, alleged to be due for goods and merchandise sold the defendants. The plaintiffs are represented by Peterson, Bishop & Clark.

Wife's Jealousy Causes Suit.
Jealousy on the part of Mrs. Elsie C. George is alleged as grounds for a divorce action started today by T. J. George. The complaint alleges that she accused the plaintiff of gross infidelity and humiliated him on numerous occasions. Haley, Haley & Stetson and R. J. Warner are attorneys for the plaintiff.

Jackson Decried Guilty.
Leonard Jackson who was recently indicted for larceny of a bicycle at Freewater and who pleaded not guilty, was found guilty by a jury in circuit court this morning. He will receive sentence Friday morning. Jackson, who is colored, had the courtroom in mirth a number of times when put on the stand. He still protests that he bought the bicycle.

Dog Licenses Near 300.
The county clerk's dog license bureau today had reached 255 licenses by noon and was still going this afternoon. Each license requires considerable paper work in addition to stamping a collar and picking out one of proper size for the dog licensed.

Estate Worth \$528.53.
The estate of the late Mrs. Rena Taylor Robinson was appraised today at \$528.53 in an inventory filed with the county clerk.

Oatley Left \$2783 Estate.
The estate of James Oatley, the old man found dead in his cabin on Camas Prairie during the December blizzard, has been appraised at \$2783 in an inventory filed today by George Noss, A. S. Quant and John Endecott.

County Assessor Convalescing.
County Assessor C. P. Strain is reported convalescing from a four weeks' attack of erysipelas and he is expecting to be able to return to his office by the end of this week.

Smith-Weidert Case on Trial.
The case of Smith Brothers vs. Peter Weidert was taken up this afternoon in circuit court before a jury, with Peterson & Clark appearing for the plaintiffs and James A. Poe for the defendant. The plaintiffs are seeking \$10,000, which they allege is due for goods and merchandise sold Mr. Weidert's brother-in-law, Charles Fenn. The contention is that Mr. Fenn leased Mr. Weidert's ranch and that the latter agreed to stand good for goods sold Mr. Fenn. Later Mr. Fenn is alleged to have absconded, leaving a number of debts. The case involves interpretation of the statute of frauds.

GERMANS PLAN 100,000 SOLDIER POLICEMEN

BERLIN, Jan. 14.—Germany proposes to have about 100,000 "Sicherheitspolizei"—literally, safety police—or soldier policemen, according to Wolfgang Heine, Prussian minister of interior.

In a talk with the United Press, he explained that he, nor Neume, evoked the idea of such a police system which is already organized in Berlin and which is being formed in other cities throughout Germany.

This police force looks like soldiers. It carries rifles, hand grenades, a policeman's billy. And it travels in sets of four or five.

Its organization has been found effective, Heine explained, and he believed that the rest of the world, with the exception of France, was willing to have it maintained in view of the fact that it had proved its worth as a preventive against internal troubles.

"One of the results of the war," said the minister, "was the tremendous increase of criminals, a great number of whom possess rifles, revolvers and even machine-guns. The old police failed badly on some occasions and some were, and are, killed every week."

The force has proved effective in dissolving illegal meetings and otherwise, said Heine. Most of the men are about 24 years of age, and are carefully selected for daring and reliability. Provisions are made for a certain amount of training of these men, and also it is arranged that, if they tire of police-soldiering, they can enter other lines of government activity.

"There are about 10,000 such police in Berlin now," said Heine. "Other troops are being formed throughout Germany. This will leave the regular army of 100,000 free to keep Bolshevism from spreading through the eastern border and to the rest of the world."

Furthermore, if we ever go to the legislature we shall introduce a bill that requires all daily newspapers to suspend on holidays.—Galveston News

TWO HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS OF DENVER TAKE LIVES WITHIN LAST 36 HOURS

DENVER, Jan. 13.—Two high school girls suffering from nervous diseases have shot themselves here within the last 36 hours. Soon after reading that Mildred Stuart, 15, had killed herself, Edith Clapper, 14, a classmate, put a bullet in her head and is believed to be dying. Miss Stuart was melancholy because her classmates ostracized her socially, she thought. Miss Clapper's nervousness resulted from difficulty with her studies. Authorities found no suggestion of a suicide pact or of a disappointing love affair in either case.
