### Real Appraisers Named.

### Sommers-Bolan Case on Friday.

The circuit court session on Friday will be devoted to the trial of the case of E. P. Sommers vs. Jerry Bolan. This is an action by Sommers to recover what he claims is due him on commission on the operation of a blacksmith shop at Echo. He asserts in his complaint that he rented Bolan the shop and equipment in return for which he was to receive half of the profits. He alleges that Bolan "held out" on him. Peterson, Bishop & Clark represent the plaintiff and James A. Fee the defendant.

### COST OF JELICOE'S TOUR \$400,000 ABOVE EXPENSE OF-SHIP HE SAILED ON

MELBOURNE, Jan. 15.—The cost of Lord Jellicoe's tour throughout Australia, in the interests of the Australian and New Zealand navies was more than \$400,000 above the cost of maintaining the vessel wherein he kept headquarters, according to a statement by First Lord of the Admiralty, Walter Long. Lord Jellicoe had at his disposal H. M. S. New Zealand, one of the Commonwealth's most modern battle cruisers.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—The supreme council Saturday decided that the inaugural meeting of the league of nations will be held January 16. Leon Bourgeois, of France, will preside and deliver an address as will Earl Curzon, of Britain.

### LID OFF ON OPERA. PARIS EXPECTS ITS GREATEST SEASON

PARIS, Jan. 15.—This winter's season at the Opera Nationale and the Opera Comique will be enjoyed with greater relish than ever by Parisians and visitors to the French capital, as it is the first time since the war that Paris producers have been able to give opera with all the accompaniments which make it the leading social and artistic feature of the season's entertainment.

The most interesting event of the Opera Comique thus with the debut last week of Miss Hilda Roosevelt, cousin of the late Theodore Roosevelt, in the role of Manon in Massenet's opera of the same name. The verdict of Paris critics was highly flattering to Miss Roosevelt and the consensus was that she invested the role with all its traditional charm and brilliance. The Paris press referred to the "delicious voice" of the young artist, which she "managed to perfection," and in terms of praise commented on the variety of her acting, "which was by turns passionate, dramatic and playful," maintaining without dissent that Miss Roosevelt's interpretation compared favorably with that of Sibyl Sanderson, Hellroenne and Mary Garden.
